NAMING THE MEN.

The Republicans Nominate S. D. Street For Clerk of the Courts and Vic Keller For Recorder.

S. B. Frum and George M. Futman Nominated For Supervisors.

The Doings in Detail.

In accordance with the published call the republican county convention was held at the court house yesterday afternoon.

John W. Baird called the delegates to order, and after reading the call, Mr. B. F. Clayton nominated E. M. Love, of Caron, as temporary chairman.

On motion of John Lindt a committee of three were appointed on permanent organization. Those named were: John Lindt, of Council Bluffs; Robert Wilson, of Center, and H. O. Seiffert, of Avoca.

While the committee were preparing to report, Colonel Dailey, by consent, called attention to the coming veterans' reunion to be held here, and urged the delegates to aid so far as possible by soliciting and sending in to Quartermaster Sapp contributions of all sorts, provisions, money, etc.

The committee on permanent organization reported in favor of B. F. Clayton as permanent chairman, and W. W. Bigler, of Belknap, as secretary. The report was adopted.

Mr. Clayton, on taking the chair, sensibly remarked that he had no speech. The convention had met for business, and he hoped the business would proceed with the usual harmony characterizing republican gatherings.

S. D. Street was duly declared the nominee of the convention.

On motion of Mr. Sapp, the convention proceeded to an informal ballot for recorder.

The names of Vic Keller, of Council Bluffs; C. P. Koehler, of Macedonia; E. P. Brown, of Neola; C. C. Smith, of James township; and E. P. Brown, of Neola, were presented and the informal ballot resulted as follows: Keller 49, Smith 24, Koehler 18, Brown 7.

Mr. Keller was thereupon declared the nominee.

The convention then proceeded to nominate supervisors, the first being to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of S. D. Frum's term of office.

Col. Sapp moved that Mr. Frum himself be nominated by acclamation, which was carried unanimously and enthusiastically.

For the other supervisor, Alex. Osler, George M. Putnam, Jerome Turner, Basil Fox and Joseph McCord were named.

THE TROUBLED POOLS.

The stir in one serves to keep the others stirred—the Progress and the Outlook.

The Chicago Tribune thus clearly explains the relation which the St. Paul pool has in regard to the Council Bluffs pool:

The general managers of the Northwestern, Milwaukee & St. Paul, and Rock Island roads will meet in this city to-day for the purpose of trying to effect a pool or an agreement on the business between Chicago and St. Paul and Minneapolis. Since the establishment of the Albert Lea route to Minneapolis by the Rock Island quite a lively contest has been going on between this road and Northwestern and Milwaukee & St. Paul. Previous to the establishment of the Rock Island's Albert Lea route, the Northwestern and Milwaukee & St. Paul had an agreement for the division of the St. Paul traffic.

But since that time the pool has been imperative, and rates to competing points on those lines have been cut very low. The Northwestern and St. Paul roads claimed that the Rock Island had no business in their territory, and the Rock Island contended that it had as much right to go to the northwest as they had, and it meant to stay. A few weeks ago the Milwaukee and St. Paul declared its willingness to admit the Rock Island into the St. Paul pool, but the Northwestern refused. Last week a meeting of the Council Bluffs roads was held in this city for the purpose of reorganizing the Iowa pool and getting the Milwaukee & St. Paul to join in the arrangement. The latter road declared its willingness to join the Iowa pool on condition that first an arrangement was made by which the Northwestern business could be stopped. It was then agreed that the managers of the Rock Island, Northwestern and St. Paul roads should meet to-day and settle their difficulties if possible. It is understood that all three roads are now willing to bury the hatchet, and that they will effect a pooling arrangement by which rates can be restored and maintained. If this arrangement is perfected there will be no further trouble in reorganizing the Iowa pool on a satisfactory basis.
