# METEOROLOGICAL

Signal Office Summary for the Month of September.

The meteorological summary for the month of September, just closed, for Omaha station, as furnished by the signal officer in charge, Mr. Alexander Pollock, shows the following interesting statistics:

Mean barometer 30.064, mean temperature 67.5, mean humidity 64.2, prevailing direction of wind southeast, daily rainfall .017.

Highest barometer 30.301, on the 20th; lowest barometer 29.707, on the 17th; monthly range of barometer 0.594.

Highest temperature 91.0, on the 13th; lowest temperature 40.8, on the 20th. Greatest daily range of temperature 50.2, on the 18th; least daily range of temperature 11.5, on the 29th; mean of maximum temperature 78.3; mean of minimum temperature 56.0; mean daily range of temperature 21.4.

Prevailing direction of wind, southeast; total movement of wind 49.84 miles; highest velocity of wind and direction 26 miles, northwest, on the 18th.

Number of foggy days, 0; number of clear days, 10; number of days on which no rain or snow fell, 1; number of cloudy days on which rain or snow fell, 3; total number of days on which rain or snow fell, 5; depth of unmelted snow on ground at end of month, 0.

Dates of lunar halos, 26; dates of frosts, 0.
