SOUND DEMOCRACY.

A Strong Ticket Nominated by the County Convention.

The Douglas county democratic convention was held in the city hall at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The democrats of the city and county were out in full force.

Hon. John A. McShane, chairman of the county central committee, called the convention to order.

Patrick Desmond moved that Char Rodick, Esq., be chosen as temporary chairman, which was carried unanimously.

George Shields and Jerome Person were nominated for secretary. Mr. Shields withdrew and Mr. Pease was nominated.

COUNTRY COMMISSIONER.

Richard O'Kane, Silas Morton and Henry Riser were nominated for the office of county commissioner.

Mr. Moore, of Elkhorn, and Mr. Leary, of the Fifth ward, were appointed tellers.

The result was: G'Keefe, 27; Mor. 18; Riser, 15.

State senators were next nominated.

G. S. Montgomery, Jas. W. Savage, G. C. Clark, T. W. T. Richards, G. V. Gallagher, Chas. H. Brown were nominated.

Mr. Fitzmorris moved to suspend the rules and make the nomination of Messrs. Savage and Brown by acclamation. The motion was carried.

The chair appointed Meers, Kaufman, Saelens and E. J. Johnson to wait upon Mr. Brown and inform him of the action of the convention.

Judge Savage being out of town, no action was taken in respect to his nomination.

The committee retired, and, after a short recess, returned with Mr. Cowen, whose appearance was greeted with applause.

Mr. Fitzmorris moved to proceed to the nomination of representatives, and that the two highest on each ballot be declared nominated.

Mr. Shields moved to amend to nominate three members of the house from the country precincts.

Mr. Timme moved to make it two members from the country, which was carried.

Fred Cronemeyer, F. M. King, Adam Stengle, J. R. Watts, Samuel J. Howell were nominated.

The first ballot resulted—Cronemeyer, 26; Stengle, 16; Howell, 15; King, 14.

Cronemeyer was declared nominated. Mr. Watts withdrew.

The next ballot resulted—Howell, 34; Stengle, 8; King, 6.

The nomination of Howell was made unanimous, and Mr. Howell was called out and made a speech.

Mr. Cronemeyer was called out and made a speech and promised to do his duty as a democrat and as a representative of labor.

A ballot was taken as follows: Goss, 37; Turtle, 35; McGavock, 26; Clark, 24; Jordan, 23; Ford, 21; Rasmussen, 20; Trotschke, 18.

The nomination of Goss, Turtle and McGavock were made unanimous.

Another ballot was taken and resulted: Clark, 32; Ford, 24; Jordan, 23; Trotschke, 16; Rasmussen, 6.

H. G. Clark was declared nominated.

Another ballot was taken and resulted: Jordan, 22; Ford, 19; Trotschke, 8.

A. D. Jones moved to nominate Mr. Jordan by acclamation. Carried.

CENTRAL COMMITTEE.

Mr. Tammie moved to continue the central committee for another year.

On motion of Mr. Fitzmorris the convention tendered thanks to Chairman R. Dick.

Three cheers were given for Savage and Brown.

Call for a Workmen's and Farmers' County Convention.

The workingmen and farmers of Douglas county, who are in accord with the principles enunciated by the state anti-monopoly convention, will be at Hastings, September 27th, 1882, to elect delegates to a convention that will nominate a legislative ticket for Douglas county, consisting of two members of the senate and eight members of the house of representatives, also one county commissioner and such prosecuting attorney as may be designated by the county commissioners in their election proclamation.

The ratio of representation shall be as follows:

Every element of trade and each element of common labor shall be represented by five delegates. Where mechanics or laborers have no organization, they may organize for this purpose, as for instance blacksmiths, carpenters, machinists, timbers, small workingmen, laborers, etc. Every precinct outside of the city of Omaha shall be entitled to five delegates to be chosen by the farmers and laborers of the precinct in which they reside.
