Judge Dykeman, of the New York
supreme court, decided that the telegraph

At Hanover, Va., Saturday a team
belonging to a man named Potts ran
away, took over the reins and threw the
driver and child and the child was
run over and killed instantly. The lady
was severely injured.

Henry Hallman, a farmer near Brook-
field, Mo., Friday morning went to the
winter kitchen, got in a barrel, swung a
pail over his head, tied it about his neck
and "glazed" away to the barn and
straggled to death. Temporary insanity
was the cause.

Claims allowed by the Garfield board
of audit Saturday were as follows: Profes-
sional services—Hiss, \$7,000; Hamilton,

other bills were settled in the amount of

operating expenses during the year were
\$12,000,000, interest paid, \$5,000,000; divi-
dends paid, \$4,000,000.

The Pacific Railroad Debt.

WASHINGTON, December 2.—Accor-
ding to the public debt statement,
the bonds issued to the Pacific railway
companies, interest payable in the
money, are as follows: Principal out-
standing, \$64,025,512; interest ac-
crued and not yet paid, \$1,615,587;
interest paid by the United States,
\$5,534,440.82; interest prepaid by the
companies by transportation services,
\$14,098,500; by cash payments, 5 per
cent of net earnings, \$30,000; balance
of interest paid by the United States,
\$37,279,632.

THE SIOUX COMMISSION.

ST. PAUL, Minn., December 3.—
The Sioux commission returned to St.
Paul today from Standing Rock. The

Peters, whose burning and sinking
was reported last night, and in which
thirteen persons lost their lives, gives
the following new points of the hor-
rible accident: Nobody knows the
cause of the fire, but the boat burned
like tinder. It was on the last trip
and everybody was in good spirits.
The storm increased as we got out
from Milwaukee; the wind was tor-
rential, the snow blinding, and the sea
heavy. The flames were fifteen feet
at the top of the night. Our line was
cut or burned off and we were drift-
ing, our centerboard lost, mainmast aft,
and we were unable to render any
assistance other than to bring our
about daylight without being able to
pick up anybody. It was pretty
rough. We saw the barge burn right
before our eyes and could not lift a
hand to save the poor fellows aboard.
The captain of Peters was Charles
Smith, aged 40, unmarried; mate,
John Lawson, aged 42, married and
much liked on the lake.

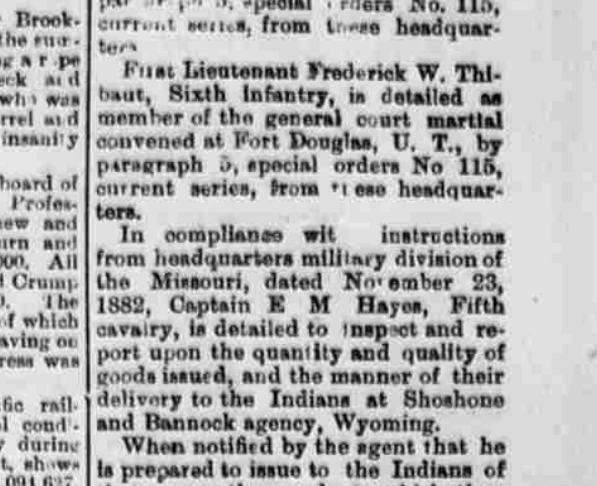
