 The stock market showed an increase in business and an advance in prices this afternoon, the net result being @ 1 1/4 per cent on the general list. Between 11:30 and 2 o'clock prices fluctuated. In the last hour the stock market continued quiet. The only stocks in which there was any activity were Western Union, which was stronger at near the highest prices of the day, and Delaware, Lackawanna & Western, which was weaker at the lowest prices of the day. All other stocks were firm. The net result of the day has been a larger sale of shares than any day last week and an advance of @ 3/8 per cent over the prices of Saturday evening.
