The Work of Relief Progressing Systematically at All Points.

The Flood of Business Follows the Receding Waters at Cincinnati.

No Faith r Danger Apprehended

The Flooded Regions

Special Dispatch to This Day. CINCINNATI, February 19.—The river was stationary from 6 to 9 this morning, but fell one inch from 9 to 10 when it fell to 59.2. The work of manufacturing gas is progressing, and a portion of the city was lighted to-night.

PHILADELPHIA, February 19.—The Ohio flood relief fund amounts to \$4,000. The public will be appealed to. The Commercial Exchange has appointed a relief committee.

INDIANAPOLIS, February 19.—The relief committee at New Albany have issued an address to the citizens of that place, calling them to give liberally and freely to aid the many sufferers by the floods.

CINCINNATI, February 19.—The executive committee of the relief committee, at a meeting this afternoon, issued the following address:

The Cincinnati relief committee of the chamber of commerce and common council desire to thank their friends in other places who have so generously come forward with subscriptions for sufferers by the flood, and announce that, having resolved in the beginning to use all funds received from abroad only in relieving our neighboring citizens and towns, that we have all we can do judiciously for such purposes.

LOUISVILLE, February 19.—A test was made this evening, showing the flood exceeded that of 1832 by three feet, three inches. Several freight trains passed over the bridge to-day. The weather is clear and pleasant. Contributions continue. The distribution has been systematized so as to guard against deception, and afford relief only to the worthy.

New York, February 19.—Merritt Halsted telegraphs to The World: "It is proposed to raise a commission of the most competent men, as possible from working politicians, to superintend the expenditure of \$1,000,000 on reconstructing our principal streets. If we can cause the city to be decently paved, we might even cause the streets to be cleaned, and thus have cause to bless the flood that wrought it.

CINCINNATI, February 19.—W. A. Vanderbilt to-day, through Capt. Geo. N. Stone, added \$2,500 to the relief fund. The receding waters are followed closely by the flood of business. The city will be lighted to-morrow night.

New York, February 19.—The Brooklyn Eagle announces that there will be no charge in the editorial or business management of the paper. The court has refused a mandamus compelling the mayor to issue a license for the production of the Passion play.

Special Dispatch to This Day.

NORTH ADAMS, Mass., February 19.—A heavy tornado prevailed east of the Hoosac Mountains yesterday, particularly at Deer. The depot building at the latter place, 60x20 feet, was torn to pieces, the foundation moved four feet. The passengers and operators escaped uninjured. A freight car was blown across the Troy & Greenfield railroad track.

BRAIDWOOD, February 19.—The work of rescuing the bodies of the buried miners assumed a more business-like manner to-day. Three companies of workmen had been formed, consisting of sixty men; each has a foreman and works eight hours a day and through the night. Trams have been built to haul dirt to dam. At 10 o'clock this morning the dam was completed, and pumping was commenced with two pumps. At 6 o'clock this evening the water had lowered five feet in the main shaft. This they think very encouraging. Three more large pumps will arrive to-night.

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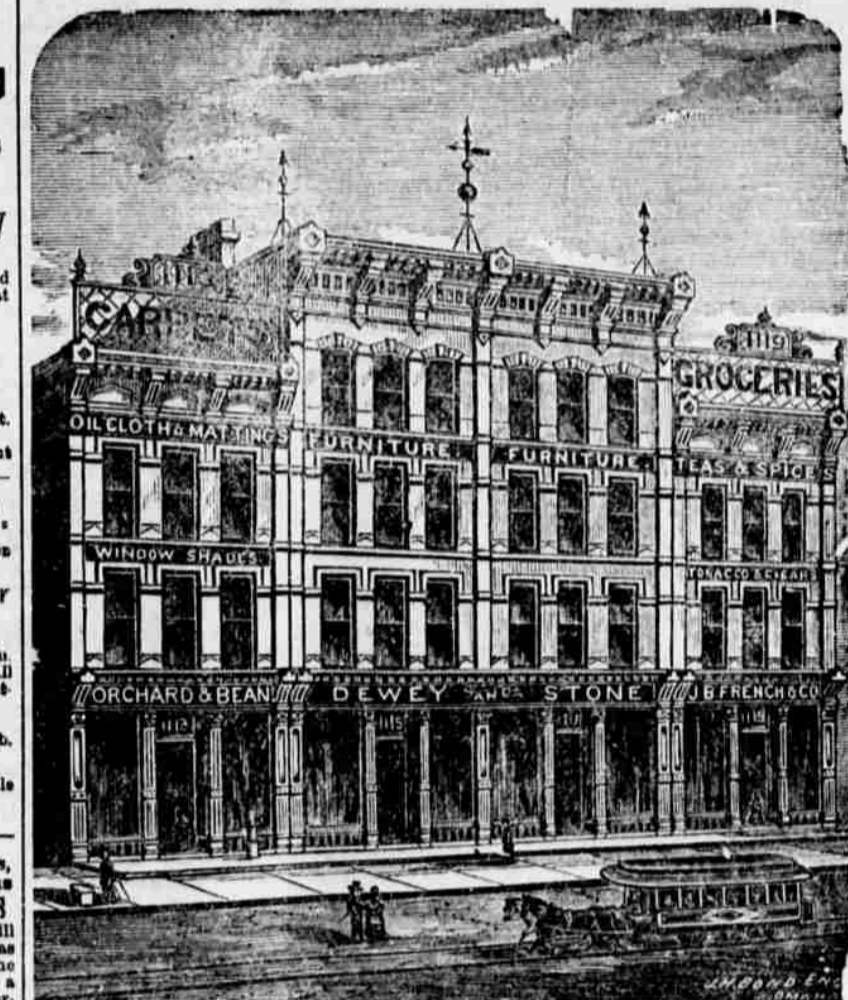
