What became of the money is mystery which no one seems to be able to solve and the police have no clue to work from with any prospecof recovering the lost currency.

The only theory advanced on the subject is that possibly some member of the family in the strangeness of the new surroundings felt a little uneasy about the money and arising in their sleep took the box and put it away so safely that in their waking moments they cannot discover it again. It would seem impossible th at any robbers could have obtained possession of it as they could not by any manner of means have re bolted the doors and locked the windows from the outside, and again as there are but two rooms in the house, both of which were occuuied by the family,

At all events, it is a warning those who have money on hand to de posit it in a bank, and not keep i about the house exposed either to burglars or somnambulists.
