A GRAND BOOM.

Permanent Organization of the O. B. & N. R. Co. Commences to Commence at Once.

At the call meeting of the board of trade quite a number of our leading business men were present, with Mayor Bowman in the chair.

Articles of incorporation were read by the secretary as reported by the committee. The articles of incorporation as read were adopted in full.

Resolution by Mr. Baldwin that the officers as mentioned in the articles of incorporation be declared the officers of this corporation. Resolution carried.

The articles provide that the capital stock shall be \$1,000,000, to be increased by order of the board of directors; that they shall begin business from the day of filing the articles, and to continue in existence for fifty years; and that not less than four directors of the corporation shall be residents of Council Bluffs.

Twenty eight of the leading business men of the city have signed the articles of incorporation, and a number of more will as soon as they can be seen.

On motion of Mr. Palmer it was ordered that the stock books be now opened.

The following named parties were elected as directors of the corporation: J. W. Chapman, E. L. Shugart, J. J. Brown, Thomas Bowman, Samuel Haas, J. M. Palmer and J. T. Hart.

The officers as named, are: J. W. Chapman, president; E. L. Shugart, vice president; Thomas Bowman, secretary; Samuel Haas, treasurer; and J. J. Brown manager and superintendent. The executive committee are, J. J. Brown, John W. Chapman, E. L. Shugart, Samuel Haas and Thomas Bowman.

HOMES OF THE FRIENDLESSES.

The relief association in that carried to such a successful issue the charitable work of our city the past winter has been incorporated under the title of the Council Bluffs Home of the Friendless association.

Membership in the association is open to all. Any person, male or female, who pays in the sum of ten dollars will receive a certificate of membership for five years; any person paying one hundred dollars will receive a certificate of life membership.

The object of the association is to purchase a lot or lots, or tract of land, upon which to erect one or more buildings, in which to provide a home for the poor and friendless, young or old. It is intended, if it sufficiently develops, to have an industrial school, gymnasium, etc., in connection with the home.

We are happy to state that the managers have already leased a house fitted it up, and now have it in successful operation. There are now a number of orphan children in the home.

The ladies meet at the Home this afternoon at 2 o'clock, to make articles needed by the inmates. All ladies of the city are invited. Public notice of all meetings for the transaction of business will be given. At these meetings, all citizens, male or female, who are subscribers to the fund, as above indicated, will be entitled to vote.

Mrs. Rockefeller, a very worthy and accomplished lady, has been engaged as a matron. Mrs. R. Morgan and M. J. P. Filbert are the solicitors. The expenses of the Home

will be large, and the association must depend upon the support of the city. The ladies intend soon to call on the citizens and secure pledges for amounts to be paid monthly, for current expenses. It will thus be seen that the home is an established fact, and placed upon such a basis that a charitable inclined citizen can take a pride in building it up. When the ladies come asking for your donations, give liberally. We can give to no more worthy object. We understand that a committee of gentlemen will be appointed to solicit large donations for the purchase of lots and erection of buildings.

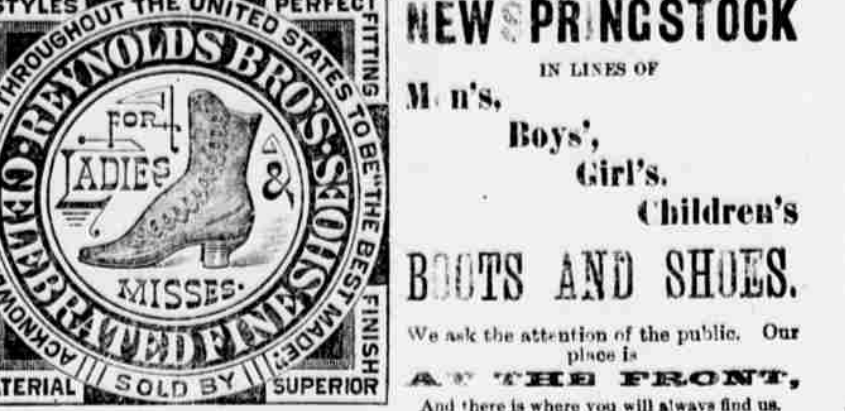
