shape of boards it is now proposed to employ straw solidified by chemical means and then shaped into the size and thickness desirable for building purposes. All kinds of straware used, the raw material being used first made up into pulp by the ordinary process and then rolled into thin sheets, about twenty-four of which equal an inch in thickness. While wet and hot, and in a condition to readily absorb liquids, these sheets are passed through a vat of chemicals heated to 280 degrees F., the excessive temperature being sufficient to scald the li-quid into the sheets till they are thoroughly impregnated with the chemicals.

At this stage the sheets pass through that the space between them is not perceptible; the sheets are in fact quiring one to four weeks, in a storeis claimed will not do so when dry. This material, which has stood some very satisfactory tests, is made principally into flooring, ceiling, black-board strips and friction-wheels.

The sub-committee appointed at the November meeting of the Board of Fire Underwriters to suggest better methods of projection from fire in the dry goods district have completed their reports. More than one half of the buildings in the district are found to be over 80 feet high, and of these 186 are over 80 feet, 24 are 90 feet, 7 ever 100 feet, and 1 is 129 feet high. On this subject the report says: The number of buildings above seventy-five feet in height in the dry goods district (as well as in other

parts of the city) is a great and grow-ng danger. It may be that the most effectual way of conquering this obstacle is by charging in an increasing ratio for each five feet above sixty-five except where the building are absolutely fire proof. In this connection the committee call your attention to the matter of stand pipes, for which an allowance has heretofore been made by the companies. By consultation with the chief engineer, your committee learn that the most of these are useless through neglect. No further allowance should be made for the stand pipe commonly in use. Your committee find that within the limits of what the underwriters now understand as the dry goods district there are placed but two steam fire engines. There are such engines near the outer bor-ders of the district, but the cost of property within it is seemingly the reason why it is within itself so bare of fire extinguishing apparatus. Your committee know of no better use to which a section of the city hall park, on the corner of Broadway and Chambers streets, can be put than the erection of a building to contain at least

two steam fire engines. Referring to the water supply of the city, the report says that it will take five years to build a new aqueduct from the Croton water shed, and urges that an abundant supply can be secured from the Ramapo valley in two years.
