

They number less than one missionary to a million heathen. The gospel is not foreign to any people, but all are seeking it and waiting for us to carry it to them.

Investigation reveals true religion everywhere, but it is too often buried in falsehood. The underlying principles-God, immortality, punishments and rewards, are common to all.

There is a striking resemblance in the
symbols employed to represent religlous ideas.

All of this gives a broad basis for the work of missionaries which is to bring the truth to light, reveal false-hood and thus elevate the heathen to a higher standard.

Rev. J. W. Armstrong delivered a very interesting discourse to a large congregation at the Methodist church yesterday moraing. He selected for his theme "Christian Duty," in which he clearly depicted the mission of every follower of the Savior. The substance of this able sermon was that all Christians were in duty

He did not believe in compulsory religion or conversion.
