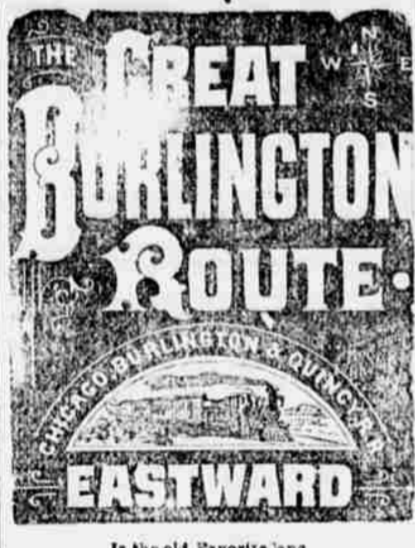

THE PULPIT

It is our design to furnish a few condensed sermons with every Monday's issue. In this way our readers will become familiar with the ideas promulgated from the pulpits of this city. In these articles we will not make a favorite of any particular church, but will favor all kinds of religious thought.

The Congregational church of Council Bluffs has all the comforts and many refined decorations, such as stained glass, cushioned seats, an elegantly furnished pulpit platform, and an excellent pipe organ.

After the rendition of several choice pieces of music by the choir of trained voices, the pastor, R. V. Oyrus Hamlin, preached his Sabbath morning discourse, taking his subject from the passage in Acts which tells us that God made of one blood all nations of the earth. He said Paul preached to the Athenians in a practical manner. He had something which they needed. They worshipped at a shrine inscribed to the unknown God, and he told them of that God. He claimed fellowship with them, while he showed the deficiencies in their worship.

All men are moved by the same feelings and have often all very much the same religious desires.

Religion has groped in blindness, but it has sought for light, is still seeking for light, and in some measure all nations are finding it.

In all nations God has accepted worshippers, no matter how false the system by which they worship. Nearly all races and tribes believe that an altar must be published, and that salvation is the great end of life. Unwillingness to obey the truth when it is made known to us is the great sin that drives God from the hearts of men.

We can look with confidence on what science tells us of the origin of man. If it can be proved that the golden rule was originated in China hundreds of years before Christ uttered it, why need we attempt to deny it? It simply proves that the truths of religion are extremely ancient; that they are german to us; that it is the food on which our souls have always lived.

It is not an accident that some nations are greater than others. Earthly conquests do not dictate geographical boundaries. Spiritual conquests are the most potent factors. The nations that neglect God disown themselves.

The truth is too often kept back. It is not allowed to step forward and assert itself. We must have a settled purpose to accept and obey the dictates of truth.

We send emissaries because we are impelled to impart the light, the truth, which we possess. There is not as many of these workers in civilization and enlightened religion as there should be. They number less than one missionary to a million heathen. The gospel is not foreign to any people, but all are seeking it and waiting for us to carry it to them.

Investigation reveals true religion everywhere, but it is too often buried in falsehood. The underlying principle—God, immortal, punishment and rewards, are common to all. There is a striking resemblance in the symbols employed to represent religious ideas.

All of this gives a broad basis for the work of missionaries which is to bring the truth to light, reveal falsehood and thus elevate the heathen to a higher standard.

CORN—Good supply, prices at yards, 50c; delivered, hard, 11.00 per ton, soft, 5.50 per ton.

MEAT—Fairbank's, wholesaling at 13c. FORTY—Pork, dealers paying 13c per pound for turkeys and 10c for chickens.

VEGETABLES—Potatoes, 45c; onions, 50c; cabbages, 20c; peas, 30c; apples, 2 1/2 @ 50 per barrel.

EGGS—Ready sale and plenty at 13c per dozen.

STOCKS. CATTLE—3 @ 65; calves 5 @ 67.50.

HOGS—Market for hogs quiet, as the packing houses are closing; shippers are paying 5.50 to 6.50.

The grain dealers are paying good prices for corn. Farmers can get from 33 to 35c now and farmers will do well to take advantage of these prices.

The dealers continue to pay these prices, notwithstanding a marked decline at all the other points.

The Queen's Giltie. We hear from London of the death of Queen Victoria's famous gillie, or personal attendant, John Brown.

General Sherman recently gave the following particulars in regard to Wm. McK. Dyer, the new chief of police in Washington: "He was graduated at West Point in the year 1853, and served from that time continuously until September 30, 1870, when he was honorably discharged at his own request at the time of the reduction and consolidation of the regular army, and for the purpose of settling in Iowa on some land which he owned. Subsequently, by the great fire of Chicago, he lost the fruit of his investments, and then made known to me his desire to go to Egypt to enter the military service of the khedive. At the time I was authorized to employ about twenty officers and had their records thoroughly examined; he was one of the best. He went to Egypt, served there with marked distinction, returned home about 1879, and published a most interesting volume of his experiences in Egypt and Abyssinia. Since that time, I think, he has been employed in the interior department. I knew him personally when in command of Fort Laramie, and know that he was a good disciplinarian and he stood very high in the estimation of all the military authorities then and since. His resignation and discharge were purely his own acts and resulting from no other cause than his own necessities. He is about fifty-one years of age, in good, strong condition, universally esteemed by his brothers in the military profession, and I believe, he will make a first-class superintendent of police."

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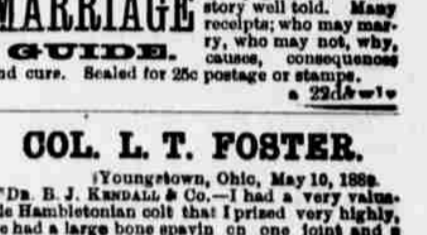
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
