In Delhi. The great city of the Grand

Mogul, the Rome of the East, has suffered many vicissitudes. Razed by conquering armies, it has declined in the course of 1000 years from a population of 2,000,000 to the extent of Buffalo or Cleveland. Conquered by the British in 1808. it has remained under the flag of England, with the brief interval of three months in 1857, when a body of Sepoys, under the bloodthirsty Nana Salb, seized the citadel, slaughtered the English residents and part of the garrison, and re-sisted the besiegers from June until December. British vengeance was as atrocious as native treachery. The rebels were strapped to cannons and blown into fragments, but Nana escaped and has never since been found. The city, though despoiled of much of its ancient splender, is still one of the most interesting places in the east. Its palaces and mosques are considered worth s pligrimage from the most remote countries. The edifice of the Grand Mogul rivals the most gorgeous palaces in the world, while the morques, forty or more in number, revive the most glorious traditions of the religions of the east. Built of solid materials, Delhi was regarded as safe from destructive fires. It was at Delhi, as the sacred city, that the ceremonial of proclaiming the queen empress of India was held. It was there, too, that the most sumptuous pageant welcomed the prince of Wales in his tour through the Indian realm.
