From a total of 47 licenses granted last year, and the same number given the previous year, and quota this year leap up this year to 88—a policy which cannot be justified on any grounds of public need or expediency.

OTHER LANDS THAN OURS.

The week abroad has been marked by few of the startling disclosures of its predecessors, and parliament has dined along without any incidents of more than passing interest.

THE Danish press complains of the unwholesome and arbitrary conduct and brutal abuse of power of Prussia in North Schleswig. The number of Danes in North Schleswig has of late years largely increased by an apparently thoroughly organized immigration of new elements from Denmark.

ITALY has successfully resumed specie payments, the reserve of specie available being something less than seventy-four per cent. It is seventeen years since Victor Emanuel drove the Austrians from the peninsula and set Venice free.

THE false prophet El Mahdi is reported to have captured Khartoum. This gives him complete control of the White Nile region; enables him to cut off the Sudan from Lower Egypt, and to put a stop to the ivory trade.

PRINCE Bismarck has long been casting about for an expedient to discourage the outflow of the German people. Russia has resolved upon a system which might be made to work effectually.

FROM Russia comes continued news of plots of poisonings and arrests of nihilists. Within a few weeks we have had announced the suicide of the ex-minister of the interior, Makoff, of the Post Director Perelli's two attempts on his life—suicide and another attempt owing to discovered faithlessness in office—of discoveries of gigantic defalcations in the railroad management of the empire, of the unexpected in the capital of a band of nihilists and a store of dynamite in their possession.
