It is expected that about twenty more will come in under a \$400 license, thus making about sixty in all, bringing in from the business an annual income of \$24,000.

THE CITY'S FINANCES.

How They Have Been Handled by the Council.

City Auditor Burke has figured up his accounts to the first of the month and has prepared the following report for the council's action to-night: To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Council Bluffs:

General fund warrants from March 1 to April 1, 1985 90; General fund warrants from April 1 to May 1, 1985 84; Total, \$7,460 74; Amount of Library fund, 1,177 38; \$8,638 14.

The discrepancy between the warrants issued and bills allowed, \$510 84, occurs by bills allowed by previous council, but warrants not drawn until after this council convened.

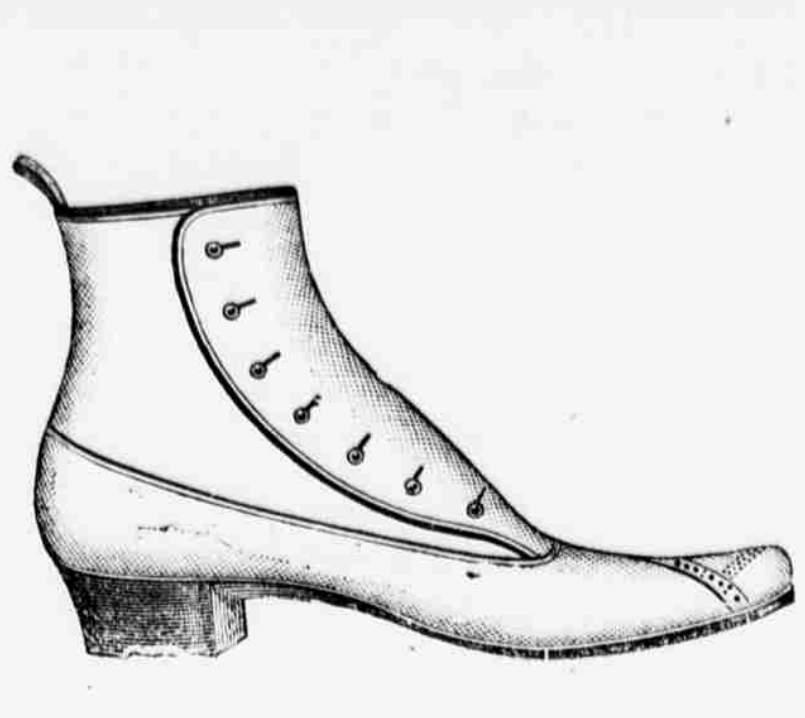
