

CITY COUNCIL.

A Peck of Petitions and a Raft of Resolutions.

Lots of Business, but Little that was Very Important.

The city council held a meeting last evening at which there were present: President Baker and Messrs. Anderson, Bism, Dunham, Hascall, Kaufmann, Loeder, McGuckin, Murphy, Redfield, Thorne and Woodworth.

From the mayor: Nominating Michael McEnery as policeman, vice B. F. Walker, term expired, Referred.

The following official bonds were approved: R. G. Guthrie, city marshal, John O'Donohoe, Halftan Jacobsen, Geo. Wittmack, James Douglas, Michael Whelan, Eugene Pickard, Wm. Astman, Tans. Ruane, A. F. Sigwart, W. A. Lane, G. W. Church and Peter Matz, policeman and P. S. Lettenring, city physician.

From F. A. Fox and others: Re-questing to do certain grading in Hayes and Hill's addition. Granted. From H. Jacobsen: Asking for thirty days' leave of absence, the first asked in seven years of service. Granted.

From E. O'Sullivan: Complaining of nuisance on Dorcas street, near Tenth. Referred. From the chairman of the board of public works: Requesting an assistant in his office. Referred.

From the A. R. E. Inviting the council to attend Memorial Day, May 30th, services with them. Accepted. From the officers of the German School Association: Asking that a certain portion of the tract known as Market street be vacated and sold to them for building purposes. Referred.

From attorney: For T. A. Murray in regard to damages to his lot on Douglas and Twenty-ninth street by change of grade and improper sewerage. Referred.

From Lewisit Burnham: Calling attention to a dangerous hole in alley between Chicago and Cass streets west of Twenty-second, etc. Referred.

The city engineer's estimate of grading needed on Gmbling street was referred. From a committee of the Old Fellows' association proposing to erect a drinking fountain for public use on the west side of Fourteenth street between Dodge and Capitol avenues. The city will permit, and by the necessary pipes. Referred.

From L. V. Morse asking that Capitol avenue from Fourteenth to Sixteenth streets be graded and put in condition for curbing. Referred. From P. Henriksen: Offering to sell and place 400 yards of earth in alley near south sewer for 8 cents per yard. Accepted.

From M. J. Melia & Co.: Offering 2,000 yards of earth at 8 cents per yard. Referred. A number of bills were presented and referred.

The city engineer's estimate of paving in Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth and Harney streets was filed.

The city engineer's list of sidewalks to be repaired and constructed in the Second and Third wards was referred.

From citizens of North Omaha: Asking for a change in the system of numbering streets in North Omaha and the following changes: Saunders to Twenty-fourth. Wheaton and Pierce to Twenty-fifth. King to Twenty-sixth. Campbell to Twenty-seventh. Irene to Twenty-eighth. Referred to the committee on public property and improvements.

By Leader: To put two men now employed at Hanson park on street force. Lost. A couple of resolutions to reduce taxes were referred.

A couple of sidewalk resolutions were referred. By Tarane: To open drain or connection with the main sewer on Jones street just west of Ninth. Adopted.

By McGuckin: To appoint a committee of three to confer with the county commissioners and ascertain if the convict labor at the county jail is not substituted for labor which persons desire to do at fair wages. Adopted.

By Leader: To enlarge culvert on Twelfth street near California. Adopted. By Behm: To increase the street force to six teams and fifteen men. Adopted.

By Leader: To fill up a culvert on Chicago street between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets. Referred. By Behm: To have all alleys at once put in good sanitary condition. Adopted.

By Kaufmann: To fill the washouts on lower Tenth street. Contractors ordered as to do. By Redfield: To correct certain evils complained of in alley between Tenth, Eleventh, Chicago and Daventport streets. Adopted.

By Redfield: To procure 100 blank paving bonds at a cost of not exceeding \$40. Adopted. By Redfield: To repair washout at southeast corner of Twelfth and Dodge streets and to extend the culvert across Dodge street to drain block 102. Adopted.

By Murphy: To bring Twentieth street, between Dodge and Daventport streets, to grade if board of education will pay the amount chargeable to the city. Referred. By McGuckin: Directing an ordinance drawn up to protect the city from all rapins of paving on streets now being paved or that will be paved and that repairs be assessed to proper-

ty owners on said streets for the fifteen year to come, excepting the intersections of streets and alleys. Referred. By Anderson: That the city engineer furnish a profile of the grade of Saunders, from Coming to Grand street, and give estimate of cost. Adopted.

By Tarane: To have the sidewalks in the First and Second wards, reported by the city engineer, laid and repaired. Adopted.

By Kaufmann: Instructing the city engineer to furnish estimates of the cost of grading Jackson street from Eighth street to St. Mary's avenue. Adopted.

By Redfield: Inquiring whether a special tax levy can be made so as to become delinquent at the date of completion of contract, or whether provision cannot be made in the levy to answer same purpose. Placed in the hands of the judiciary committee.

By Redfield: To advertise for bids for the construction of storm water sewers from the present terminal point of the South Omaha sewer near St. Mary's avenue to Farnam and Twenty-second; also proposed sewer from Harney, north on Sixteenth, to Chicago, thence east on near the river; also Jones street sewer to the river, and also North Omaha sewer. Referred.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. Recommending cancellation of interest when the principal of taxes assessed against Jane B. Dort is paid. Adopted.

Also reduction of taxes against C. J. Canan. Adopted. Also to instruct the city engineer to devise means of drainage to put Cass, Eleventh and Chicago streets in passable condition. Adopted.

Also to approve plat of block 13, 14, and 15 known as Rath's addition. Adopted. Also that Ninth street be paved when the city has funds to do so. Adopted.

ORDINANCES. An ordinance ordering that part of Sixteenth street within paving district No. 8 paved was passed. An ordinance ordering that part of Ninth street in paving district No. 1 paved was read twice and referred.

An ordinance to provide for the issue of \$100,000 bonds of the city for constructing and maintaining sewers was introduced. An amendment to make the bonds \$100 each instead of \$1,000, so as to allow Omaha people to invest, was lost.

An amendment to make the rate of interest 5 instead of 6 per cent was also lost. The ordinance was then passed. Adjourned for one week.
