Michael Clohassy appeared before Justice Abbott yesterday on complaint of Margaret Clohassy, who charged him with assault. He was fined \$5 and costs.

There is not much danger of any one violating the ordinance in regard to fast driving on lower Main street. It is in a horribly muddy condition, accompanied by floods.

William Pierson, of Pierce street, is having trouble with some of his many tenants, and proposes now to take of the roof of the house as a speedy way to get them to move out.

The trial of Patrick Ratigan, charged with murder, came to a close yesterday, it being given to the jury about 4 o'clock. At 11 o'clock the jury was still out with a prospect of remaining till morning.

There were lively times in the vicinity of "the blue barn," on Broadway yesterday afternoon, there being two fights not a half-hour apart. Dan Bassett and a man named Carroll, living near by, seem to have been chiefly interested, and the police had to act as peace-makers.

Justice Schurz was yesterday trying to settle some differences arising from the struggle as to who shall be host of the banquet. Mrs. Norton complains of Mr. and Mrs. Wittig for threats to burn her house, while Monsieur and Madame La Fleur appear in their usual position as witnesses. One woman designed for a witness was too drunk even to testify, and had to be carted off to jail.

There were only two members of the board of trade who responded to the call for a meeting to make arrangements for entertaining the 280 editors who are to arrive here from the east next Wednesday. The city council has decided to join with the board in the entertaining of the guests, but unless more enthusiasm is shown it looks as if there would not be much board to join to.

For some time past there has been much annoyance and disturbance at the Sunday evening services at the Scandinavian Lutheran church, until the pastor, Rev. Mr. Christianson, concluded to try the strong arm of the law to stop it. He accordingly had Peter Canaan arrested yesterday, charging him with talking out loud in meeting last Sunday night. There was a crowd of witnesses who testified that it was not Peter, but some other man, and the court accordingly discharged him. Peter then turned about and commenced suit against the preacher for malicious prosecution, placing the damage at \$5,000.

They burglarize Harry James' Store and Change His Money from the Drawer into their Pockets.

Early yesterday morning William Reynolds, who is employed in the Boston Tea store, in going through Bayliss park discovered a money drawer lying under the fence, while wading papers, evidently belonging thereto, were scattered about soaked with rain. By an examination of the papers it became apparent that the money drawer belonged to Harry James' store, and when the proprietor of that establishment came down, he found that the thieves had entered his place by removing a part of the glass in the Pearl street door. The glass had been cut out and removed in rather an expert manner, the pieces being carefully laid down so as to make no noise, and a hole being made large enough for a man to crawl through, the thieves had entered, and torn out the patent money drawer, carrying it away bodily. Mr. James had left his pocket-book in the drawer, contrary to his usual custom. The pocket book was found with the drawer, but emptied of its contents, amounting to about \$50. There was also about \$2 of small change in the drawer, which the thieves appropriated, of course.

DEPARTING DOCTORS.

The State Medical Society Closes its Session.

The Officers Elected and Committees Appointed.

Des Moines the Next Place of Meeting.

The State Medical Society continued and concluded its thirty-first annual meeting yesterday. The forenoon session opened with the reading of the annual report of the secretary, which was referred to the committee on finance.

Dr. J. Williamson, of Ottumwa, read a very valuable paper on injuries of the perineum.

Dr. L. C. Swift, of Des Moines, presented an interesting paper on "Uterine Fibroids."

A discussion was had on ruptured perineum, in which Drs. Hyer, Carter of Omaha, D. W. Smouse, of Des Moines, and Peck took part.

Drs. Gustine, Criley and J. D. McCleary, were chosen as a committee on finance.

A telegram was received and read from Dr. D. S. Forchold, of Ames, stating his inability to attend the meeting.

Dr. A. S. V. Mansfield, of Ashland, Neb., secretary of the Nebraska State Medical society, was elected a member by invitation.

Dr. E. H. Hazon, of Davenport, gave a very interesting report from the section on otology and ophthalmology.

The committee on revision of the constitution, through Dr. Robinson, recommended a substitute of section 6, article 3, of the constitution; also a change of article 9, providing for the appointment of a committee on mental and nervous diseases.

Dr. C. M. Hoady, of Iowa City, read a carefully prepared paper on Strabismus, which called forth remarks by Drs. Crittenden and others.

The committee on publication presented its report advising the publication of proceedings annually instead of once in two years. Received and placed on file.

The report of the committee on the president's address was presented by Dr. Watson. Adopted and placed on file.

Adjournment was then taken until afternoon.

At the afternoon session yesterday Dr. Robertson, of Muscatine, reported from the section on sanitary science. The report was deemed so interesting and valuable that the doctor was requested to allow the same to be published in full.

Dr. Hale, of Des Moines, presented a written report of the section of materia medica.

On motion, Dr. Hannawalt, of Des Moines, and Dr. Macrae, of Council Bluffs, were appointed delegates to attend the meeting of the Nebraska State Medical society at Lincoln next week.

Dr. Watson, of the committee on nominations, reported the following names for the several positions, and the election was made unanimous by the adoption of the report.

And another fact in the personnel of the body was that fourteen wore glasses, and only one still clung to blue glasses. All were dressed in plain black except one, who distinguished himself by light pantaloons, while one doctor had the independence to wear a business suit of light color.
