#### A NEW BOOM.

The Omaha & Northern Railway Company Incorporated.

A Long Anticipated Scheme Put in Motion.

Articles of Incorporation were last evening filed in the office of the counrailway company.

The incorporators are S. H. H. Clark, general manager of the Union Pacific, Jacob E House, Hon. John M. Thurston, Frank Murphy and Edw. W. Nash.

The object of the association is to build, maintain and operate a railroad in the state of Nebraska, to be known under the above title. Omaha is to be the principal place

of business and the capital stock is fixed at \$2,000,000 in shares of \$100 each, said capital stock to be increased as may be deemed necessary to accomplish the purpose of the organization. The existence of the corporation be ins June 5, 1883, and runs to June 1983. The business will be conducted by a

board of five or more directors, the election and duties of which are defined in the articles. The officers, which are elected by this board, are a president, vice-presi-

dent, secretary and treasurer. The highest amount of indebtedness is not to exceed \$1,300,000 unless the capital stock should be increased.

A Big Gun Fired For Omaha's Prosperity.

A Syndicate Euying all the Land Southwest of the City.

Where Millions Will Probably be Invested.

For some days past a rumor has been in the air that an important transaction in real estate was in progrees in Omaha, but although the BEE reporter endeavored to accertain the facts, the parties were very reticent, merely admitting the fact that large transfers had been successfully negotiated for, but decilning to say what ty clerk for the Omaha & Northern was the object in view. To day there was considerable talk on the matter, and the rumor was confirmed by one

of our leading bankers. It is understood that a syndicate of English capitalists have purchased a large amount of property just west of the Summit," a few mues west of the city and on the line of the Union Pacific road. Among other tracts secured was the farm of Mr. Keneally, the papers for which are all made out at a purchase price of \$44,000. Negotiations are also under way for the Drexel farm and others contiguous and it is stated that the syndicate desires to secure a frontage of several miles along the track. It is stated that Phil Armour, of Chicago and several English capitaliess who own large cattle interests in Colorado and Wyoming are parties interested, and that as soon as the various sales have been comsummated, immense stock yards and slaughter and packing houses will be erected immediately.

By this move a large portion of the cattle which usually passed through Omaha and across the Union Pacific bridge to Chicago markets will be killed and packed at this point.

It may be stated that no sale of land has yet been put on the records and consequently none is yet concluded, but contracts have certainly been made with several parties and part paid down, with the option to the purchasers of concluding the sale or not. Mr. R. F. Schaller is the only Omaha gentleman known to be interested with the syndicate in the purchase.
