A FOREST NEAR PARA.

Endless Varieties of Trees in Brazil.

Mighty Parasites With Roots in the Air.

Exuberance of Vegetation.

The Wonderful.

A letter from Para, Brazil, in The San Francisco Chronicle, says: Only just beyond the actual precincts of the city of Para you may instantly bury yourself in the intricate mass of the dense tropical forest and lose sight of all indication of the residence of man. You are bewildered to remember you were walking in the city street only fifteen minutes ago, and you are reminded of the marvelous pieces of tapestry which, in the Arabian tale, is said to have instantly transported the happy possessor to whatever place he desired.

But beware lest you grow suddenly too poetical to be wary, for though the surrounding greenery and the glowing coolness of the air lure to untrained enjoyment, there are low hanging branches to avoid, and when the way seems most open there may be a treacherous loop of the strong, trailing vines that would quickly banish all your ecstatic ideas of beholding a monkey or the great ant-eater in his native home, especially if in striving to maintain or regain your equilibrium you should thrust out a hasty hand against the thorny trunk of an armed tree.

The thick impenetrable masses of forest growth are such that, once being lost there is little probability that one will reach the point from which he started, so that it becomes a real peril instead of a childish fear of being lost, and there are a few known instances of wanderers never being found, though an immediate search was continued for days.

The forests that sweep everywhere about Para are of primary growth and far taller than any but the pine woods of the eastern United States.

FLOWERING TREES.

Many flowering trees are found in the deepest fastnesses that have been explored along the banks of the Amazon, and at various seasons of the year they hang out clustering wreaths of huge blue, white, purple or yellow blossoms.

PARASITES THAT THRIVE ON DEAD TREES.
There are parasites, so called, which flourish just as well upon dead trees as any other parasites, thus proving they are epiphytes and not true parasites. The roots adhere to the bark of the trees and do not penetrate to rob the life blood of others.

FERNS AND ORCHIDS.
A very marked feature in this picture of forest life is the numerous parasitic putting forth their leaves among the brown twigs of strong vines or hanging on the trees. Ferns, too, find crevices in the bark of the tree trunks and wave their lovely fronds in richest profusion high above the head. Numerous orchids are thickly sprinkled on the trees, where they bloom year after year unmindful of the fact that the Indian rubber-hunter, or the still more prosaic rubber collector, may pass and repass their perches with no quick glance of admiration or stolid look of satisfaction.

ing difficulty, on a loose piece of bark that its own rank roots have displaced while it sought a firmer footing. It is among the limbs of a tree that one may find a single tiny straining thread. Even when one has grown familiar with it, it still remains an enchanted land. One need not be possessed of any very strong imagination to see, as he stands out upon the parasites: "All these once grew in their native bed, low at the foot of these tall trees. Then came some gnat and with his marvelous spade dug both plant and sufficient earth to nourish it high among the limbs." There they still lodge—the power of enchantment is not yet dissolved, and you who fascinated gaze held in thrall may admire and wonder, but you will not live till the spell is broken.

These forest scenes were one day enjoyed by two gentlemen of my acquaintance. One of the two was a naturalist, the other a young physician, and both lately arrived from a station. While collecting specimens of vegetable growth and searching for novel insects they were suddenly startled by the cry of a wild animal. They judged the creature to be about two miles distant, and immediately started in pursuit. The doctor assured himself that all the chambers of his revolver were in order, while the professor took the precaution to load his gun with a charge of coarser shot than he had been using for birds, and the march began. The cry was repeated at intervals, and as they drew nearer they became more and more sure it was a feline voice and noverred themselves for combat. But now they heard a similar cry in another direction still nearer than before, and were obliged to make a detour to avoid placing themselves between two packs. They advanced with the utmost caution, and not a cracking twig nor a rustling branch told of their approach, until the latterly arrived of the group increased at every step.
