

But, though you have been wishing to enter the Brazilian forest, you are very nurs you have not stepped upon the magic cloth, and the thought occurs that in this foreign land there may be wizards of untold power, and the strange scene around may prove to be only the work of enchantment. You pause, but the vision, far from fading, increases in distinctness as your eyes become accustomed to the shade. Outside the sunlight is even painful in its intensity, and as you enter the narrow footpath which penetrates through every part of the forest lying near to the city, there is a pleasing sense of the contrasted shade.

ROOTS IN THE AIR.

He who stands for the first time in a tropical forest will be struck most forcibly, perhaps by the singular appearance of the numerous aerial roots. These slender cords hang in tangled skeins among the branches, swaying stead of being composed of a single family (like beech or maple groves in the north, or the oak lands and pins with leaves and branches, or, growing against the trunk of a tree to mingle with leaves and branches, or, growing apainst the trunk of a tree to mingle with leaves and branches, or, growing thicker and more woody the older they become, finally themselves afford foothold for a fern or an orchid. One is astonished to find how strong these cord-like roots are.
