TENNEY'S TRIAL.

It Results in His Conviction and a Fine of a Hundred Dollars.

His Old Record Showed Up in Bad Light, Too.

Yesterday afternoon A. P. Tenney was put on trial for having taken indecent liberties with a little eight year old girl. Tenney has been in the jewelry business on Broadway for some years and has been a well known citizen here and generally respected.

The case has caused much public comment, and much indignation is expressed against Tenney, he being a gray haired man, a man of family, and the child being so young, and the offense so great. There has also been brought to the surface an old newspaper, the Wilmington Advocate, bearing date of Saturday, March 28, 1874, in which appears an account of an Albert Tenney being arrested and fined for a similar, but even more outrageous offense.

The Wilmington paper, in narrating the particulars of the indecent assault made upon a little girl there, denounces Tenney bitterly, and declares that was not the first offense of the defendant committed by him, and that the citizens had called an indignation meeting to deal with "the monster" as he deserved. In that case Tenney was fined \$100 and costs.
