TRAVEL IN AUSTRIA.

Picturesque Journey Over the Mountains From Trieste to Vienna

Some of the Advantages of Class Division in the Cars-The Varying Scenery Along the Route.

Correspondence of the Philadelphia Press VIENNA, June 28,—"Only foreigners and fools ride first on the Austrian and German railways, where the second-class accommodations are as good as the first in any other country," were the parting words of one who has had experience sufficient to be a just judge; so I was utterly without class prejudice when I walked into the magnificent railroad station at Trieste, with its crowd of porters, sol-The following are the time of arrival and departure of trains from the local depots. I had the general American impression that we were the only people in the world who understood "railroading," but my opinions are undergoing a radical change, and the more I see the more decided are my conclusions that one can travel here more rapidly, more safely, more economicly than at home, and with as much more the reasons that you can have luxury and disadvantages. The idea of being locked up in your bed is at first unpleasant, but one soon becomes accustomed to it, as at every station where your train stops there is a delay of four or five minutes. Then your door is opened, and before the train starts the "guard" visits your compartment and sees that you are on board.
