John Lambert, Ed. Williams and William Stewart, the three boys arrested at Glenwood for stealing cutlery from the Empkie Hardware company's store here, were yesterday tried before Justice Schurz, and sentenced to thirty days in jail.

John Taylor, aged 80, and his wife, aged 74, are very low with malignant dysentery, of the same type as that at Weston. Neither is expected to live, owing to their advanced ages. Dr. Cook is attending them.

A man named Mason who was arrested the other day for assaulting one Johnson and who was fined \$5 and costs by Justice Schurz, was yesterday brought before Judge Alesworth on a charge of disturbing the peace, the charge growing out of the same transaction. He pleaded guilty and was again fined \$5 and costs. Besides that he has been placed under \$300 bonds to keep the peace. Rather a dear price, all together for draping one eye in mourning.

There was little new learned yesterday in addition to that already published in THE BEE, in regard to the suicide of young DeLong. The remains of the unfortunate were taken by his brother, Sam DeLong, to Madison county, where his mother and step-father live. The young lady who was so concerned in the case, and to whom he had seemed so attached, had little to say yesterday about the affair, and had hardly recovered from the nervous shock which resulted from his tragic death. It was a sad ending indeed.

REED ON THE LYNCHING.

What Judge Reed Had to Say to the Harlan Grand Jury About Hardy's Hanging.

The hanging of Hardy, the Polk City murderer, is still fresh in the minds of the public. On the opening of the district court with Judge Reed presiding, the matter was referred to in his charge to the grand jury. A newspaper correspondent thus summarizes this part of the charge:

He referred to the occurrence in general terms as a violation of private rights. He said that the frequency of such events was due to a feeling on the part of the public that the proper machinery of the law was either defective in its operation, or that the administrators of the law permitted too many guilty parties to escape. He cautioned the grand jury that they were a proper constituent of the court, and just as they discharged their duty would their influence be felt, either in the frequency of such events, or in the steadiness and certainty of punishment of offenders.

He suggested that the grand jury should investigate some other time as more opportune for such an investigation, but it was for the jury to determine whether they would now investigate that transaction. He suggested that it ought to be investigated, but his questionable reference to the date of such investigation was taken as a hint by the grand jury that so far as the court is concerned they need not trouble themselves with such an investigation at this particular time.
