The city council has decided not to pay any longer its half of the salary of S. W. Morse, the special policeman at the Union Pacific depot. Fourth avenue has been ordered to grade. The property owners wanted it filled up about half, but the council went in for the whole thing or none. Among the marriage licenses yesterday were C. H. Twombly and Sarah Clarke, both of this city; Wm. Adams and Dorothea Leiman, also of this city. The board of supervisors did little yesterday besides discussing road matters. In the afternoon they took a drive on to the bottom to see about a road there. The county board is now waiting to see whether the Union Pacific will give up the bridge on Union avenue, or will pay the county something for it. They needn't wait. It will be gobbled. The young folks are looking forward with high expectations to next Tuesday which will be "children's day" at the fair, all children under 14 to be admitted "free gratis, for nothing, without any pay."

FATAL FIGHT.

A Council Bluffs Boy Kills a Des Moines Man.

A Great Surprise to the Many Friends of Holley Lewis. A sad surprise flashed over the wires yesterday afternoon, bringing to J. B. Lewis, the well-known saddler on upper Broadway, the startling news that his son had killed a man in Des Moines. The telegram was from W. R. Vaughan, who is at present in that city, and was soon followed by others, giving a few more of the facts. The telegrams stated briefly that two men had entered his room, claiming possession of it, and a quarrel arose in which young Lewis killed a man named Degan. Lewis claimed it was done in self defense, but was placed in jail. The last telegram further stated that public sympathy and the press were in sympathy with young Lewis. Mr. Lewis started last evening for Des Moines. The young man is well known here, and has such a reputation as a peaceable and industrious, that those who have known him from childhood were greatly surprised, and, without waiting for any details, were free to express the belief that if he had killed a man, the man must have deserved killing.

Another Account. Des Moines, Iowa, September 4.—The stabbing of Arthur Fagan by his roommate, N. H. Lewis, ended in the death of Fagan. The quarrel arose about admitting a cousin of Fagan to the room and led to sleep during the night. Lewis gave himself up to the police, and the coroner's inquest is now in progress. ANOTHER FIRE!

It Gives Another Showing of the Detective Alarm System. Yesterday morning about 9 o'clock an alarm of fire was caused by the discovery of smoke pouring from the upper part of a one-story frame house on Avenue B, between Eighth and Ninth streets. The house was owned by Postmaster Armour and occupied by Joseph Kirk, a carpenter. The fire apparently caught from the cooking stove. The fire department got out in pretty good shape and worked so actively that only the roof was burned badly. The fire alarm system is entitled to no credit, however. The alarm was turned in from box 19, but it struck No. 12, on the gong, and did not register any number, as there is no box of the number struck on the gong, the alarm, besides being of no help, was on the other hand, a source of confusion. The fire has been again called attention to the unreliability of the present alarm system, and almost every fire illustrates it. The chances are that some day it may be illustrated too forcibly. If a confused alarm sends the steamers off on some wild goose chase away from the real fire, giving it time to get under big headway, there may be a destruction of property which would pay for several alarm systems. The trouble is, as in many other enterprises, the city wanted to be too economical, and it got cheap boxes and appliances, run its wires on poles where there were other wires, and in fact got up a botched affair, which needs to be thoroughly overhauled and changed. There is an economy which is extravagant, and this seems of that kind. Not only are the boxes cheap but the registers used are so sensitive, and require constant adjustment and almost momentary watching. The system at present is worse than the old-fashioned yell of fire, which was about the only alarm sent in. Council Bluffs has one of the best and most efficient departments of any city in the west, and it is too bad to cripple its usefulness by asking it to rely on such a faulty system of alarms.
