A GRAND SUCCESS. The Crowd Increasing at the Fair and Races.

The Best Sport Of All Promised To-Day.

Yesterday's Doings Not Spotted by Showers--Rare Races To-Day.

The heavy rain of the previous night was rather a dampener upon the prospects of the fair yesterday, but as the clouds broke and the sun came out in the morning, everybody felt glad again, and by noon there had quite a large crowd gathered on the grounds, but about that hour the clouds began gathering again, and many who had proposed to go down to the grounds, remembering the moist time had on the last Fourth, waited to see how it was coming out before venturing into the hacks and street cars.

During the early showers of the afternoon the crowd on the grounds kept close to places of shelter, and were not very venturesome. The weather brightened up, however, and gave a chance for the races, the wind and sun doing much to dry the track some, though it was still a little heavy at the beginning, but dried so rapidly that at the finish dust appeared in spots. Despite the risky showers the attendance was larger than on the day previous, and everybody was delighted, and the promise is of a still larger attendance to-day, as it is to be the best day of all on the track, as will be seen by the programme, which includes the 2:23 and 2:34 classes, besides the novelty races.

Some of the too economical souls who tried to sneak into the grounds yesterday by going through cornfields and pastures and crawling under the fences, were nipped yesterday by the officers on watch, and made to pay over their half dollars, so that besides having their trouble for nothing, they were subjected to the mortification of being the observed of all observers. One fellow was escorted through the crowd clear to the gate, and there compelled to buy a ticket, making him run quite a gamut.

G. W. McFadden, of Atlanta, Ill., had the monopoly on sheep, he being the only exhibitor, and his show being a fine one indeed. Another boy had his curiosity in the machinery department satisfied yesterday. It was Oscar Sprink, a son of John Sprink. He got his thumb into some of the machinery, the flesh being quickly stripped off, and the thumb badly mashed. The little fellow was put into a carriage and taken to town for treatment.

The agricultural reporter of the Non-Parlier is now liable to be relieved, since his writing up the fair has given a glowing account of all eight-year-old calves. A. N. Carpenter, of Galena, the landscape gardener, is making an interesting exhibit, both here and at the Omaha fair. The city authorities have been in correspondence with him in regard to the improvement of Fairmount park, for which nature has done so much, and which merits the expenditure of some money in improving and beautifying still further. Mr. Carpenter has been looking over the park since his arrival, and thinks that it will take little money, comparatively, to make it very beautiful and convenient.

COOPER AND M'GEE, the well-known hardware men, make a very creditable display in the exposition building, especially of stoves, some of which are beauties indeed, as well as being as well up in their ornament. They have the Garland stoves and ranges. They also exhibit the Hub Royal, square heaters, which take the lead in their class. The Hub heaters, round sheet-iron stoves, are also excellent. Cooper & McGee also make a fine display of carpenter's tools, and builders' bronzed hardware. The display is a showing which not only attracts attention, but proves that they keep up with the latest and best in their line.

FRIEDMAN'S DISPLAY. The space occupied by H. Friedman, whose establishment, No. 321 Broadway, is well known, is one of the most attractively arranged of any in the exposition building. The goods in richness, variety and numbers, are very creditable, and are displayed very tastily. The millinery display is very fine and excites much praise from the ladies who crowd about it. There is a large showing of plumes and flowers. There is not only the latest styles of bonnets and hats, but of cloaks, some of which are very beautiful, and children's and ladies' hoods in great variety. Fancy goods, yarns, zephyrs, etc., complete which is one of the best displays in the hall.

BARKE'S PHOTOGRAPHS as displayed in the Exposition building, attract and merit much attention. They are excellent, and yet are but samples of the work done daily at the Excelsior gallery, 100 Main street. Mr. Barke displays some very handsome plaques, introduced as suitable for holiday gifts. Barke has gained the reputation of keeping always to the front in his line, and the beauty and finish of his pictures, bespeak the true artist. The display made at the fair in numbers, variety and quality of work, would do credit to any artist in any exposition in the land. Mr. Barke proposes to exhibit also at the Avoca district fair.

THE RACES. There was, despite the showers, a goopy crowd in the amphitheater to witness the races, besides many in carriages, and the thick line along the fences. The Harmony band again furnished music for the races yesterday. The boys play pretty well, though their repertoire is not very extensive.

A. G. Hancock, of Kansas City, added to his laurels yesterday by his promptness and firmness with which he started and judged the races. He is the best man in that place which the association here has had yet.

The first event called was the 2:50 class. Of the six entries two failed to start--Mojaska and Glenwood. The starters were placed as follows: Lucy B., Lorene, Bay Mack and Toronto Maid. The first heat was rather tame. Lucy B. kept the lead from the start to the finish, Toronto Maid pushing up within a length and coming in second, Lorene third, and Bay Mac, who acted badly in scoring and was off his feet most of the distance round, bringing up the rear. Time, 2:38 1/2.

The second heat was a good deal of a "ditto," save that Toronto Maid kept a little closer on to Lucy B. and held her down pretty well clear to the finish, Lorene coming in third, Bay Mac couldn't or wouldn't keep his feet and dropped far behind, then ran in, saving

his distance, but when on his feet once showed himself capable of pretty good speed and a square trot. The time was 2:35 1/2, a little faster than the previous heat. The third heat was a little more interesting, Lucy B. and Toronto Maid keeping pretty well abreast to the half mile, Lucy B. leading slightly. The Maid on the third quarter broke but got down again, while Lorene crawling up the three bunched pretty closely. Bay Mac behaved pretty well until on the homestretch when he went off his feet again, but came down quickly. Lucy B. passed under the wire an easy winner, while Lorene, by a fine sprint, crowded her nose ahead of Toronto Maid and came in second, the Maid being third and Bay Mac fourth. Time 2:34 1/2.

A QUARTER MILE DASH was thrown in as a novelty between Sorril Bill, Black Bill, and Mollie Cooper. Mollie Cooper won in 27 1/2 seconds. Sorril Bill second, and Black Bill third.

ANOTHER CHARIOT RACE was given yesterday by Miss Nellie Burke and Prof. Beardley, each driving four horses abreast. It was a dead heat, time 2:00.

THE RUNNING RACE was naturally a little slow, owing to the condition of the track. The starters were Katie B. and Ella Rowett. Katie B. led by two lengths through the mile. Ella Rowett closing the gap on the finish, but leaving Katie B. an easy winner, time 1:57 1/2.

A HALF MILE DASH finished the afternoon's sport. Bee's Wing won it in 55 seconds, Peter Reed second, and Sorril Bill third.

RALE SPURT TO-DAY. To-day, if the weather is at all favorable, there will be the best races of the meeting, and the sport will beat that of Wednesday evening.

The great event will be the 2:23 trot, in which there are some very fast horses, including Big Soap, who made such a sensation Wednesday, Will Benham, Strathian, Ensign and Lillian. There will also be to-day the 2:34 class, with such fast flyers as Nellie Woodruff, Anglin, Columbus, Dublin Boy, Malvina, Jack Peregrine, Trapeze, Anna Laura and Maud H.

There will also be a novelty race, in which Council Bluffs, Dawn of Day, William, Narvin B., Col. Hepburn, Winnie B., Black Prince and Ella Rowett are entered. Besides these there will be the Roman standing race, an exciting one indeed, never introduced before on any track in this part of the country. A chariot race will also be given. With such a programme the big crowd may be assured of having a treat indeed.
