Bids for Paving, Grading and Curbing Opened and Approved.

The Board of Public Works met last night and awarded several contracts. Bids were opened for grading Farnam

street between Twenty-fifth and Twentyninth, and John Peterson was awarded the contract at sixteen cents per yard, the estimated amount to be moved being 20,000 yards.

The contract for re-curbing and gutter ing Farnam street between Sixteenth and Lieutenant Merriam Wins the Indi-Eighteenth, was let to R. G. Jenkinson, who is to use part of the old material.

A bid for paving the cross streets-Eleventh, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth-was opened. A majority of the property owners having only one bidder, the Barber Asphalt Paving company, who offered to do it for of the council.
