THE HARVEST OF SOULS.

The Growth and Progress of the Protestant Episcopal Church as Shown in Convention.

Thirty-Third Annual Meeting of the House of Bishops and Deputies at Philadelphia. Senator Edmunds Declines to be a Candidate for President of the Latter or Any Other Body of Men.

PHILADELPHIA, October 3.—The thirty-third general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church of the United States opened this morning with services held in the venerable Christ church on Second street, near Market, the corner stone of which edifice was laid in 1772.

The gold alms dish, presented to the House of Bishops by the convocation of Canterbury, England, occupied a prominent place in the altar, surrounded by vessels of silver communion service, presented to the parish by Queen Anne, in 1780.

The House of Deputies of the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church of the United States met in September, 1878; the dangers that assailed it and its want of organization, while other churches in the late colonies were fully organized.

The House of Deputies of the general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church of the United States met in the church of Holy Trinity, Rev. Chas. L. Hutchins, of Medford, Mass., secretary of the last convention, called the names of the clerical and lay deputies and having declared the church was represented in a majority of dioceses.

Rev. G. F. Girault and Senator Edmunds conducted the president to the chair. Dr. Boardley said they had come together at a most interesting period in the history of the church.

Secretary Hutchins was re-elected, receiving 157 votes, 109 for Rev. L. H. Tschudy, of Kentucky. The assistant secretaries are Rev. Henry Austis, J. W. Miller and E. W. Worthington.

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A SPECIMEN FIRE.

The Magnificent Buildings of the Pittsburgh Exposition, With All Contents, Destroyed.

An Endless Variety of Exhibits of the Arts and Sciences Ruined by Fire or Water. The Population of Two Cities Witness the Destruction of \$1,000,000 Worth of Property.

PITTSBURG, October 3.—The magnificent buildings of the Pittsburgh Exposition society, on the north bank of the Allegheny river have been totally destroyed. The immense structures, with their almost endless variety of exhibits, illustrative of every branch of art, science and mechanical skill, which were yesterday viewed by thousands of people, and since the opening, September 6th, by hundreds of thousands, are now a miniature mass of splintered and powdered embers and tangled iron.

THE LUMBER POOL. CHICAGO, October 3.—The first annual meeting of the lumber manufacturers' association of the northwest, which includes practically all wealthy and leading firms engaged in the trade, was held here today. It was adopted as the sense of the meeting that curtailment of log cutting should be made from a double standpoint, namely, that forests cannot stand the present drain and that the present production exceeds the market to become largely overstocked.
