of the Masonic temple was laid square, level and plumb, true and trusty.

The building, as it will appear, will have a frontage of 105 feet and a depth of 100 feet. The front will have an ele-vation of sixty-eight feet, while a tower will rise twenty-five feet above the roof, and over the main entrance, which will be of Gothic style. The front is to be of

THE PR being supported in a truss manner. The Marshal J. W. Peregoy, in the following rest of the second floor will be devoted

to offices as d other rooms. On the third floor will be other offices, ante-rooms, etc., and the temple proper, which will be about 36 by 60 feet, with a large dome in the center of the ceiling, for ventilation, light and orwament.
Taken altogether, the building will be a marked improvement to the city, and will be one which will reflect credit on the enterprise of the order which erects it.
