The Bee has repeatedly called the attention of the School Board to the fact that proper steps had not been taken for the protection of the scholars and teachers from cold while attending school, and for the keeping of the school rooms in a comfortable condition. Several times during the present term our scholars had to be closed owing to the disagreeable and cold temperature of the school rooms and the lack of fuel and proper facilities for keeping them warm. On last Thursday five rooms in the high school building were closed and the scholars sent to their homes for the reason that the heating apparatus was out of order. It should have been attended to long ago in order that the scholars may have the services of their teachers, that for which the tax payers and parents pay. It will be some time before the heating apparatus can be repaired during which time the pupils will be compelled to remain at home.

Dr. West, dentist, 14 Pearl street. A Political War. Thursday evening The Globe published a scurrilous article in which it personally attacked Jas. P. Goulden, and used language in reference to him which is seldom heard outside of a saloon.

Yesterday morning Mr. Goulden met Mr. Whittelsey, the writer of the article, and after asking for and receiving the information that he was the author, proceeded to thump him. In the melee a revolver fell to the sidewalk, though it is not claimed that any one attempted to use it. Captain Haight attempted to part the two men, and received a severe blow from Mr. Goulden, though it is not claimed that the blow was intended for him. Mr. Whittelsey did not defend himself with his fists, and the two were soon parted.

In the afternoon Mr. Goulden appeared before Justice Abbott and complained against him-elf, pleaded guilty and was fined five dollars and costs. Information was later filed before Judge Aylesworth charging Goulden with carrying concealed weapons, to which charge he also pleaded guilty, and was fined \$5 and costs. He was also charged with disturbing the peace, but claimed that the charge was justly included in the one for assault, for which he had already paid a fine. This question was taken under advisement by the city attorney. The Bee does not uphold any man in fighting except in self-defense. But there is no use in suing unless there is a possibility of collecting on a judgment.

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COMMON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

The U. P. Road Wants More.

At an adjourned meeting of the common council held Thursday night, a petition signed by most of the principal agricultural implement dealers, and several other citizens was presented, asking the right of way for the U. P. R. R. Co. to lay a track for street cars as steam cars, up Durant street from the Transfer to Main street. It is easy to see how such a track would be a benefit to the U. P. road and a great accommodation to the implement dealers and other wholesale shippers. The petition was referred to the judiciary committee.

The U. P. road also asks the city to vacate the alleys in block 9, Grimes' addition, which are the center of the roadways, opposite the Metropolitan hotel, where the alleged depot of the U. P. side track ends. The U. P. road generally offers to pay for publishing the legal notice to vacate. The matter was referred.

Ex-Mayor W. R. Vaughan had introduced a resolution to allow the Pilcher Council Bluffs Electric Light company to erect poles and string wires in the streets and alleys. He promised, on behalf of the company, that it would furnish one light to the city free of expense. The matter was referred to the committee of the whole with instructions to report to an adjourned meeting of the council at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon.

At the adjourned meeting the board passed a resolution granting the right to the Pilcher Council Bluffs company and also to the Council Bluffs company, at the head of which is J. W. Rodefer, to erect poles and put up notices under direction of the common council. They are restricted to the use of the alleys when it is possible to use them. They are required to replace all paving when paved streets or alleys are used; and in case the city wants to pave or grade any street on which poles are erected the company must remove said poles if ordered so to do by the council. The city is not rendered liable for any damage to private property by reason of granting the franchises, not in any citizen debarred from bringing suit against the company for damages.

The poles and wires are to be erected according to the rules of the New York board of Fire Underwriters, which will place them high enough so they will not interfere with the use of the streets or alleys. In consideration of the franchise either or both companies accepting are to furnish the city with one light free, to be placed where the Common Council may direct. Mr. Vaughan expressed himself as entirely satisfied with the resolution as passed, and says the plant is now on the way here, and that the company will immediately proceed to furnish light for the citizens.

At the Thursday evening meeting the council passed an ordinance to provide for the curbing, paving, graveling, macadamizing and guttering of streets and alleys in Council Bluffs, Iowa. The ordinance gives the council the right to order the improvement of any street or alley at the expense of the property. It requires that the council shall advertise in two daily papers in the city for proposals to perform the work, for at least five days, and longer, if deemed necessary. It may also advertise in any other paper if the magnitude of the job requires warrants it. All bidders are required to give bonds for the acceptance of the contract if awarded. All contractors must give heavy bonds for the performance of the contract. The ordinance provides that after a contract is let for certain work on any street, the property owners will not be permitted to perform any part of the work to the detriment of the contractor. It also provides that the city shall be liable to the contractor for any such amount as it shall collect by assessment on the property, and that the general fund shall not be pledged in any manner for the payment of the improvement.

John Haille wanted to paint the lamp posts in the city for fifteen cents a post, and use a good iron-preserving paint. The matter was referred to the committee on gas. The council will meet this evening at 7 o'clock to decide what streets it is necessary to grade this fall, and to order advertisements for bids for labor.
