The Chicago and Northwestern is the outgoing train on the pool roads this evening. The Milwaukee and Wabash leave as usual.

Justice Abbot yesterday, in the parlors of Kell's hotel, tied the silver cord that united William Haas and Miss Dora Oldroyd as husband and wife.

Wm. Haas, charged with being drunk appeared before the police court yesterday morning, and was fined the regulation \$3 and costs; total \$7.70, which he did not pay.

An improvement is being made on the Curtis Street school house in the way of putting up a storm door, the dimensions of which are 4x13. Mr. C. Rosen has the contract.

Mr. Joseph Gaghegan returned Friday from a trip into Missouri, where he has bought up a lot of wood which he will sell from his wood yard on Lower Main street, corner of Eighth avenue.

The search warrant case before Justice Schurz, in which Minnie Smith is trying to obtain a trunk, etc., of Sadie Roberts was continued, to be tried at some future time to be agreed upon by the attorneys.

Passenger train No. 1 over the Rock Island road, brought in three extra baggage cars heavily loaded with baggage yesterday morning. The railroad officials report heavy travel westward this month.

By legal notice posted according to law the fact is advertised that the furniture of the Little Windsor hotel, belonging to Daniel S. Johnson, is to be sold at auction October 29th, the same having been seized on a chattel mortgage.

There have been 1,116 marriage licenses issued by the clerk of the court of Pottawatomie county since January 1, 1881, at which time S. D. Stroet assumed the duties of that office. The first license he issued was to John Adams and Ella Powell.

Catharine Hopkins yesterday made application to Justice Schurz for a search warrant to search the second hand store of B. Klme for certain household furniture which she alleges belonged to her, and which her husband sold while she was away from home.

The sale of property for delinquent taxes will occur November 5th, at the treasurer's office. Fully one-half of the property now advertised has had the taxes paid upon the same since its advertisement, and the tax sale will be the smallest in the history of the county.

P. C. DeVol yesterday took possession of the property recently vacated by F. F. Ford, on Willow avenue, and will make it his future home. Justice W. R. Vaughan is negotiating for the property occupied by Mr. DeVol with the intention of making it his permanent home.

Three snafus yesterday, perhaps more. John Beno & Co. had the hind wheels of a wagon wrenched off. Church-hill's pump wagon was wrecked on Bancroft street. Becroft's hack was demoralized, the fore wheel being twisted off in the vain endeavor to cross a railroad track.

No. 1 over the Union Pacific went out last night in two sections. One section carried five car-loads of Italian emigrants who are going to Colorado to engage in work on the new branch of the Union Pacific. The other section consisted of four car-loads of emigrants who are on their way to California.

A black horse and top buggy was found standing on the sidewalk in front of George Weisner's stable, about twelve o'clock Thursday night. It was taken to Boquet's livery barn and cared for. It proved to be one of Weisner's rigs which he had let to some one. The parties had evidently taken on too much booze and left the team standing on the street.

When the leaves begin to fall in the city park they should be left there as mulching for the grass and to give strength to the soil. The system that has for years prevailed of cleaning the grass of all substances that might protect its roots from the intense cold of our winters must of necessity be injurious and eventually kill that which is now the most pleasant sward in the city.

Council Bluffs, at the recent meeting of the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., was selected as the place for holding, next October, the annual session of that body. A movement has been started by some of the enterprising Odd Fellows to organize a building association and to commence at once the construction of a large and commodious hall to have the same furnished in time to have it dedicated by the Grand Lodge in session here.

Another confidence game was again attempted by a couple of fine looking birds on the incoming train over the Rock Island road Thursday afternoon. The would-be victim was a passenger from Colorado, and the game was the selling of false claims on mines in the locality of Leadville, but the trick was prevented by the interference of the brakeman, who had been watching the rascals since they boarded the train. Railroad officials are doing all they can to expose and bring to justice these state prison candidates.

Complaint is made by passengers on trains between the local depots and the transfer that in the name of soliciting charity two men, both blind, or nearly so, are in the habit of entering the trains and singing songs and collecting money from the passengers. The Legislature to be Asked to Afford Relief the Shape of a Bill.

There is no question but that Council Bluffs absolutely requires, and that too at no distant day, a reliable system of sewerage. It will be impossible, or at least utterly impracticable to pave any of the streets in the city until some system is adopted and a grade is permanently established.

It was to urge the importance of this step upon the common council that the board of trade appointed the committee to confer with that body, as recorded in the Des of last Wednesday. There are parties who have capital and stand ready to invest it in large substantial buildings, who say that not one brick will they lay until the city adopts some system they can build to.

This winter an effort will be made to have a sewerage and paving bill passed by the Legislature which will authorize the city to issue bonds for the payment of these much needed improvements. These bonds to run a long time and bear a low rate of interest. The property to pay an annual tax of five per cent to create a sinking fund for their redemption. Of course the city could order sewers and paving, but it would amount to the virtual confiscation of a large amount of property, the owners of which are unable to immediately meet the demand that would create a first lien upon the property. A tax of two mills on the dollar is raised on the property of the city as a sewer tax, and the small fund of \$8,000 was accumulated, but the money was voted to put into the Madison street bridge and stone culvert, with the idea that Indian creek could be forced to do sewerage work. But Indian creek had no notion of being compelled to such base uses, and it flushed the sewers and washed them all out clean, stones, bridge and all. Now the board of trade insist that competent engineers be secured, proper survey be made, and some reliable and permanent system shall be adopted by the city. And this demand seems just. The matter will be brought before the council at its next meeting, Monday evening.
