There is no question but that Council Bluffs absolutely requires, and that too at no distant day, a reliable system of sewerage. It will be impossible, or at least utterly impracticable to pave any of the streets in the city until some system is adopted and a grade is permanently es-

It was to urge the importance of this step upon the common council that the coard of trade appointed the committee to confer with that body, as recorded in THE BER of last Wednesday

There are parties who have capital and stand ready to invest it in large substantial buildings, who say that not one brick will they lay until the city adopts some system they can build to.

This winter an effort will be made to

have a sewerage and paving bill passed by the Legislature which will authorize he city to issue bonds for the payment for these much needed improvements.

These bonds to run a long time and bear a low rate of interests. The property to pay an annual tax of five per cent to create a sinking rund for their redemption. Of course the city could order sewers and paving, but it would amount to the virtual confiscation of a large amount of property, the owners of which are unable to immediately meet the demand that would create a first lien upor the property. A tax of two mills on the dellar is raised on the property of the city as a sewer tax, and the small fund of \$8,060 was accumulated, but the money was voted to put into the Madison street bridge and stone culvert, with the idea that Indian creek could be forced to do sewerage work. But Indian creek No. 4 Pearl Street, had no notion of being compelled to such base uses, and it flushed the sewers and washed them all out clean, stones, bridge and all. Now the board of trade insist that competent engineers be secured, proper survey be made, and some re-liable and permanent system shall be adopted by the city. And this demand seems just. The matter will be brought pefore the council at its next meeting,
