



The repairs in the East room at the White House have been completed, and t was thrown open to visitors to-day. The entire ceiling has been frescoed. It now looks like a beautiful mosaic of silver and gold on a drab ground. The figures are squares and circles, and the design, with the gold and glitter of the rest of the room, produces a beautiful effect. The carpet of last year has been put down. It is a symphony in yellow with no decided figure, and is not strikngly beautiful, though it is heavy and elegant. It takes 420 yards of carpet to cover the East room, and it is put down with tacks nearly as large as shingle nails. The old fellow who puts it down is a German, who has put down the White House carpets for twenty years. He owns a fine brick house in the fashionable part of Washington, and has made a fortune, but found him he other day on his knees here nailing down this carpet himself.

The silver chandeliers in this room have also been burnished until they shine like the rays of the many prisms which hang like great, long, three cornered diamonds from every point of them.
