Justice Abbott has joined in wedlock Charles H. Smith and Dogmar F. Nelson, both of this city.

The Round Table gives a reception to some of its friends at the residence of Mr. A. B. Walker, this evening.

No end of the boys wasting their evenings in lounging about the streets. Council Bluffs has two night schools this winter.

The ladies of the Broadway M. E. church are to give a New England supper in the parlors of the church next Tuesday evening.

It is now decided not to have any more leave gathering in the park until the trees are all bare, so that the cleaning up may all be done at once.

Yesterday afternoon Charles H. Creighton, of Omaha, was married to Miss Kittie McHugh, of the same city, Justice Abbott performing the ceremony.

The Bluff City hose team does not propose to give up the contest with the Thurston's of Omaha, but will renew their challenge for another race within a few days.

Information is being filed inviting the prostitutes and gamblers to step up and pay their license, under the garb of a deposit for their appearance at some future day of trial, or a fine.

The following have been selected to serve as jurors in this month's term of the superior court, although it is doubtful about there being any jury cases, so they will probably never have to serve.

In the case of Rasmussen vs. the Rock Island railway, an appeal has been taken to the Supreme Court. The plaintiff is administrator of the estate of one Larson, who was killed while working for the company by a bank carving in on him.

The saloon men are now coming up to the clerk's office with \$100 each in payment of the next quarterly license. They seem as well satisfied as when the license was only \$100, and one of them remarked yesterday that he wished it was \$1,000 license instead of \$400 a year.

Judge Reed holds an adjourned term of the District court at Glenwood today, when the motion for a new trial in the Jasper N. Clouser murder case will be heard.

There was a slight disturbance at Ida Story's house of ill-fame Wednesday night, which Officer Barhyte put a stop to by arresting the seemingly disturbing elements, in the form of two young men, C. Fraser and Tom Caffery, who gave security for their appearance yesterday.

The case of the man Loring, charged with malicious mischief, has occupied two or three days in its examination. The prosecution claimed that he had got mad with one of the firm of Skelton, Hendricks & Rice, and that he had threatened to get even with them, and sought to do so by entering their tailoring establishment one night and cutting up two pairs of pantaloons with a pair of shears.

It is probable that the city council will at its next meeting take the initiative steps toward securing legislation this winter to enable the city to go ahead with the paving of the streets on the improvement bond, by which the property owners, who have to pay for the proposed paving, may have a series of years to pay for it, by paying a low rate of interest, with the option of paying a lot once if they prefer, thereby saving interest. It is thought that to pave under the present method, requiring the whole payment at once, is too great a burden on many of the property owners along Broadway and Main streets, and that by partial payments the desired improvements could be made next season.

Rev. Mr. Hamlin returned yesterday from Des Moines, where he has been in attendance upon the convention called for the purpose of organizing a Prisoners' Association of Iowa, the object of such society being to help prisoners lead an honest life, and to prevent crime. In many of the States reformatory work is being pushed zealously along this line, and with encouraging results, and it is a matter which cannot but interest all who have the good of man at heart. On Wednesday evening Governor Sherman gave an address, and other interesting addresses were given by Dr. Startwatt, of Grinnell, Chaplain Dunn, of Ft. Madison, and Mrs. Merrill, of Ames, all of whom had had experience with criminal classes, and who had given the subject much thought. An organization was to be perfected yesterday, and it is to be hoped that it may grow and meet with the desired results of bettering these classes.

A POOL OF BLOOD.

A Quarrel Over the Game Leads to a Probably Fatal Shooting.

The Assaultant Now Lodged in the Glenwood Jail.

The southern part of Mills county has been thrown into some excitement over a murderous row which took place in a saloon kept by a man named John Hall, in Solomon. The row was over a game of pool, and David Brodock, an indolent and respected farmer, while trying to separate the parties, received a bullet from a revolver in the hands of a man named McChargue, which it is thought will prove fatal.

Yesterday's Malvern Leader contains the substance of the facts as brought out on the preliminary examination as follows:

On the afternoon in question, Tom Quall, who lives near Solomon, in company with a nephew from Missouri, by the name of Alex McChargue, entered Hall's saloon and engaged in a game of pool. After running behind 30 cents on the game, they left the saloon refusing to pay it. After visiting another saloon they returned again to Hall's, and wanted to continue playing pool. The bartender told them they could play no more until they paid what they owed him. Quall asked him how much it was. "Thirty cents," said the bartender. At this McChargue broke in with, "you are a liar," at the same time drawing a self-cocking revolver. The bartender threw up his left arm, striking McChargue on the elbow and elevating the weapon, and at the same time striking him in the face with his right hat. The two clinched, and as no one seemed inclined to separate them, David Brodock stepped up and taking McChargue by the left arm attempted to get hold of the revolver. The latter, however, turned the weapon quickly and fired, the ball passing through a finger of Brodock's left hand, then through his chin, entering the neck. McChargue was immediately placed under arrest, and his preliminary examination held on Monday and Tuesday, the substance of which is given above. Before the examination was completed, however, D. H. Solomon, who was prosecuting the case, moved a postponement till November 10, which was granted. Brodock's attending physicians differ in opinion materially as to his condition—one claiming that the ball is lodged in his neck, the other that it passed out. His recovery, however, is doubtful, at the best. We are informed that the feeling against McChargue runs very high in and around Solomon. He was brought to Malvern Tuesday evening by Marshal Talbot, and kept during the night, the Marshal taking him to Glenwood and lodging him in jail yesterday.

FAMILY FUSSING. A Son Whips His Father Because the Old Man Didn't Behave.

The family of John R. Marshall, living in that part of the city known as Streetville, has had considerable trouble of late and night before last a row broke out between the head of the family and the son, a young man of about twenty. As a result the head of the family now wears two very deeply draped eyes. Constable Clatterback arrested both father and son for fighting, and yesterday morning the son was brought before Justice Schurz, but as the father did not appear against him he was discharged.

The father appeared before Justice Abbott and pleading guilty paid \$1 and costs. The son claims that his reason for pounding his father was that he was so ugly to his mother, and that he had acted in a very unbecomingly way, to say the least, toward his sister, a girl of about eighteen years. The boy couldn't stand any more of this sort of action, and in the controversy blenched his father's eyes. Mrs. Marshall has commenced proceedings for a divorce, on the ground of her husband's cruel treatment, and it looks now as if the family circle was to be pretty badly broken up. Marshall used to live in Omaha, and there had a sensational revelation of his family life about three or four years ago. The family say they have borne with him until forbearance has ceased to be a virtue.
