> The Change of Grade One of the Reasons Urged.

There has been much trouble attending the work of filling up Broadway and Main streets to grade, and various vexatious questions have been brought to the front, and are still unsettled. A petition the Pacific yesterday. has been filed in the court stating that Sarah C. Keyes is the owner of fifty feet on Broadway, east of Seventh street, it being the property known as the Herdic barn.
