FROM THE FRONT.

Great Excitement at Odebolt Over a Banker and a Lawyer.

The Bank Closed and The Lawyer Arrested.

A gentleman from Sac county, who was in the city yesterday, brings fresh details concerning the excitement prevailing in that little burg over the conduct of two of its citizens, a banker by the name of Wright, the other a lawyer named George. The bank about a week ago closed its doors, and an assignment was made to the banker's brother at Wall Lake, while the Odebolt man disappeared. It is said that almost everybody in town has more or less deposited in the bank, and the expectation of losing all their money caused the excitement to run high. It leaked out that the banker had bought a marshy piece of ground for \$600, and that he had been trying to effect a loan in Chicago of \$15,000 from a bank there with which he had been doing considerable business, and that he had been planning to mortgage this piece of property for that amount. This attempt was thwarted, but the story leaked out and added still more fuel to the flames, so that the public indignation was all ablaze. The banker returned home a night or two ago, and so intense has been the feeling that violence was feared, and he had to go to his home under a guard, and the house was kept guarded.

While the excitement was running high concerning the bank another revelation concerning a lawyer of the place, named George, gave another theme for talk. It appears that some time ago a man named Purcell, living there, was robbed of his pocketbook and a \$60 draft. A man named Hay was arrested on the charge, and George was his attorney. On the trial Hay was cleared, the strongest point in his favor being a deposition purporting to be made by a man named Hart, who was then selling nursery stock in Nebraska, and in which Hart claimed that he had paid Hay the draft in the presence of George and some other witness. It is claimed now that Hart was never in Nebraska, and that George himself went there, and impersonating Hart, swore to this deposition, in order to clear his client. George had been away for a few days, but on his return about the same time as the banker, was arrested for perjury. The excitement of the citizens, and their indignation was aroused against George that violence was feared in his case also, and he was taken to Sac City for safe keeping. Odebolt is said to have almost suspended business, and the citizens are spending most of their time in talking over the sudden change in the career of these two men, who have been so prominent in the affairs of the town.

CUPID'S CAPTIVES.

Some of Them Now Want to Get Free.

There were three divorce cases started in the district court yesterday. One of them was that of Mary M. Johnson vs. Charles M. Johnson, to whom she was married in 1870. She claims that in the course of a few years he became an habitual drunkard, and that in August, 1881, he left her, and went to Minnesota.

Another case was that of Elizabeth A. Smith vs. Silas A. Smith. They were married in Avoca in January, 1876, and she claims that she afterwards discovered that he was already married to another woman, and that the first wife got a divorce from him in May 1876, a few months after his marriage to the plaintiff. On finding this out, they separated, and now she wants the court to give her a divorce and restore to her the maiden name of Beem.

The third divorce case filed yesterday was that of Alexander T. Fowmest vs. Isabel Townsend. He claims that they were married in September 1881, at Clarinda, and that in November 1882, she had deserted him, and had since become a rather disreputable woman living in Atlantic.

All of these applicants for divorce are residents of Avoca.

DEAD BEAT DURGIN.

A Chicago Drummer Whose Business in Iowa Seems to Bleed Hotel-Keepers.

Silloway's Experience With Him.

Despite the rigid law in this State making it a criminal offense to beat a hotel out of a bill, there are many who do so. Mr. Silloway the proprietor of the Ogden house here, and the Northwestern at Cedar Rapids, has had some experience lately with one, who has been traveling for some time in this State, and who has been considered rather a straight fellow, until recently, when he seems to have fallen from grace as will be seen from the following account of him as given by the Cedar Rapids Gazette, and other information is received to the effect that he has been working all the hotels along the line.

Hotel men in several parts of the state are anxious as to the whereabouts of one D. S. Durgin, a saloon and commercial agent who recently visited this state and city in the interests of J. T. Emerick & Co., wholesale tobacconists of Chicago. Durgin came to this city about the 20th of last month, and stopped at the Northwestern Hotel, making that his headquarters, as is customary with traveling men, while working in the small towns in this vicinity. After the proprietor was interested in Durgin's future welfare about \$10 worth, that individual came in to settle up and asked the clerk to cash a \$50 check for him. The check looked suspicious and Joe refused to cash it but loaned Durgin \$5 to pay his expenses out to Belle Plaine and back. This was the last seen of Durgin for two weeks, when Mr. Silloway, when on his way to Council Bluffs, met Durgin at Marion, enroute he said to Cedar Rapids, to spend Sunday. Mr. Silloway went on to Council Bluffs, and there found that Durgin had worked Mark Durvee of the Ogden for \$5.00 board and a loan of \$10. On his return to Cedar Rapids it was found that Durgin had not been here at all. During his stay here he stole a valuable dog of J. C. Broekmit, and forgot to return a good overcoat which he borrowed (?) from the clerk at the Pullman house. About the time of Durgin's debut here he had an item published in the Chicago dailies to the effect that he had fallen heir to \$500,000, at New Hampton, which had come as a brazen lie. Mr. Silloway, after he became convinced of Durgin's rascality, wrote to the firm represented by him asking an explanation. He received the consoling reply from Mr. J. T. Emerick that they had discharged Durgin, and that as he was only working on commission, the firm were in no way responsible. The firm kindly expressed their sympathy for Mr. Silloway, however. Hotel men throughout the state will do well to watch out for Durgin, who has lain himself liable to a fine and imprisonment by his great act in this city. If he should ever want to travel through Iowa again we suggest that he come in the interest of some undertaking establishment, and carry among his sample coffins one that will fit him in case of an emergency, you know.
