

The vote this year was 239,633 less that the vote of three years ago and certainly 275,000 less than the legal vote of the state. There was manifest sluggishness on both sides, and even the democratic victory in Ohio that should have inspired the democrats and arroused the republicians, did not make the party voters respond to the call of their leaders. The notable feature of the returns this

year is the diminished greenback vote. It rose to over 90,000 in 1878 for Chief-Justice Agnew, and held up to 23,484 last year for governor, but now it is down to 4,452, while the prohibition vote is the largest since 1875, although it foots up


