BLAINE AND FOLGER.

During the recent campaign the republicans of Pennsylvania, acting upon the suggestions of Wharton Baker, passed a resolution in their state convention.

Mr. Blaine's objections to the Pennsylvania proposition are tersely stated, and they furnish, in our opinion, the strongest argument against his own pet scheme.
