her neck and shoulders. As soon as Walter saw the horrible effect of the shothe picked Mertie up and the Paxton. ran with her into the house, placing her on the bed, and then took his wounded sister in. Walter is a lad who seems devoid of sensibility enough to realize the enormity of the accident, and is none too bright. His parents had warned him not to snap caps or point the gun at any person, and the accident was due solely to his disobedience. STREET PAVING.

Work Laid Out for Next Year and Apportionment of the

Taree Hundred Thousand Dollars More to be Expended.

The city council on Tuesday evening came to an agreement as to the amount of street paving to be done next year. until Saturday night and we trust that The sum of \$100,000, voted by the city at the last election will be entirely expended in paving. This will be equal to Bea's Judge Beneke Out of a Fine \$300,000, as the \$100,000 pays for the intersections of streets and the space be tween the alleys, which is equal to one third, and the other two-thirds of the work is paid for by tax on the property benefited. The following is the work to be done:

Farnam street, from the east line of inth to the west line of Fifteenth. Howard street, from Ninth to Seven-

St. Mary's avenue, from Seventeenth to Twentieth. Dodge street, from the east line of

Ninth to Sixteenth. All cross streets hing between Tentl and Sixteenth, from Jackson street to Howard street. Cuming street from Sixteenth to Twen-

tieth. Thirteenth street south to the Union All alleys between these streets are to

e paved, mostly with granite. If there were \$3,000 more at their disposal, the council could have included Ninth street, from Capital avenue to the Union Pacific depot. It is probable that the mayor will recommend \$50,000 more in bonds to be voted in the spring so as to include the hillsides, and also the exension of Cuming street.
