ed. Another general decline ensued, which  
was succeeded by a better feeling and a rally  
of 1/2 per cent, in a report from the west  
that a prospect of a settlement of the exist-  
ing trouble between the roads there was more  
promising. Later the improvement was lost,  
and the market closed weak. As compared  
with last night's close St. Paul is 2 per cent,  
Omaha & Denver 1/2 per cent, and L. & N., and  
Kansas & Texas 1/2 per cent lower.
