





MICHIGAN'S MURDER MYSTERY.

The Latest Phase of the Crouch Tragedy.

The mystery of the Crouch murder in Michigan, it seems, is likely to be solved only by some supplemental tragedy. No One of the most remarkable occurences ever given to the public, which took place here in our midst, has just come to our knowledge and will undoubbedly awaken as much surprise and attract as great attention as it has already in newspaper circles. The facts are, briefly, in newspaper circles. The facts are, briefly, as follows: Mr. William A. Crombie, a young man formerly residing at Birminaham, a submb of Detroit, and now living at 287 Michigan Avenue, in this city, can trutfully say that he has looked into the future world and yet returned to this. A representative of this paper has interviewed him upon this important subject and his experiences are given to crime that has been perpetrated in years her husband, Henry White, and a man named Polley, were all murdered in their beds at the Crouch homestead on the night of that day. A coroner's in-quest revealed nothing. The authorities offered a reward for the discovery of the murdered man, was worth more than a million, and it was not strange that his heirs should come under the keen scrutiny of the public eye. But whoever did the foul dead covered their tracks well. Not a clue could be got to fasten the crime on anybody, but the detectives kept at work.

Nothing new was developed until about a week ago, when James Foy, a hired man of Dan Holcomb's, tried to kill a man at Union City, and failing in that blew his own brains out. But few doubted then that Foy knew all about the murder, if he had not participated in the deed. These startling incidents only added fresh zeal to the efforts of the authorities to unravel the mystery. New detectives were employed, and the keenest operatives in that art were set to work. Detective Thomas was one who had been especially active and who was believed to have got on a peculiarly hot trail. While riding on the road about two miles from the Crouch homestead night before last he was met by two men in a wagon. They stopped him and asked him his name, Being told, one of them quickly pulled a pistol and fired. The ball struck the detective and he fell. The two, believing he was killed, drove off in haste. But the man was not killed. Though severely wounded he managed to crawl to shelter, and is in a fair way to recovery. He is confident that the man who shot him is Judd Crouch, who has been arrested and released on \$5,000 bail.






