NEW YORK, March 21.

Exchange Bills—Firm at 4 87; demand, 4 89.
Governments—Strong and 1@1 per cent higher, except for three per cents, which are unchanged.
Stocks—Market opened lower on a reduction in freight rates of 5 cents per 100 pounds on grain, provisions, etc., by Commissioner Tink. The decline in prices ranged from 3 to 2 per cent. Trunk line shares were leading to a downward movement. After 11 o'clock there was an improvement in the general list and the market was quiet. In the afternoon it was reported from Boston that the Union Pacific and Chicago, Burlington & Quincy had met and adjourned without action. This at first was construed as unfavorable and the market fell off 1 to 2 per cent. Near the close it was learned that the adjournment of the railway conference at Boston was due to the absence of President Potter of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, and that another meeting had been called for next week. This created a steadier feeling and the market closed firm with a fractional rally in prices. Compared with last night the closing prices are down 1 to 1 1/2 per cent, except for Kansas, Texas & Washash, which is 1@2 per cent higher.
