The History of the Unused Marriage License.

A short time ago some curiosity was excited by the fact that a marriage license was procured at the court house by a young clerk in the city, who soon afterwards returned it and had the clerk scratch off the names. It was understood that the cause of the return was the fact that the girl's father had got on to the scheme, and opposing it, had got his daughter away and balked the plan.

It now appears that the girl was attending school here, and was from a town to the eastward. The young man was not permitted to see her, but a queer incident gave him, as he thought, the opportunity to interview her. Two young men from the town where the girl lived, came to the city. One of them had a note from the girl's father to let the sisters at the school telling them to let the two young men see his daughter.

On reaching here they met a friend of the young clerk's, and to him told about the note they had. This friend of the clerk put up a job on the two young visitors. The friend was a little curious to see what the old man said in the note, and the two visitors had their curiosity excited a little too, come to think of it, so after some persuasion the note was opened and read. Then another envelope was got, the note enclosed, sealed and addressed again. By a little ingenious planning on the part of the clerk and his friend, a piece of blank paper was inserted in the place of the original note and the note itself was kept in their possession.

Armed with this the young clerk and his friend went down to the boarding school, and thus thought to see the girl. The young clerk was so well satisfied that he could thus see her that he got a marriage license, it being his intention to skip out with the girl, if possible, while the teachers were not noticing, and get the ceremony performed before any stir could be raised about it, but on reaching the academy the plan was balked.

The note was presented, read and sent up to the young lady. She not knowing who was really in the parlors awaiting her coming, and supposing it was the persons named in the note, for whom it is said she had no such special liking as for the young clerk, sent word back that she was not feeling well and could not see them. Of course, the clerk knew that he was the one who was thus "watching and waiting for her," and he and his friend had to depart in disgust.

The two real messengers from her father, one of whom it is said, was favored as an auditor by her folks but not by her, soon after came and presenting their note, found the envelope to contain only blank paper, and the trick was learned. There was a hand of course, and the game was up. The girl's folks were very indignant, and her father came post haste and took her home. The young clerk disappeared for a day or two until the storm was passed. The license was scratched off the books, and attempts made to hush the affair up. The clerk was threatened with prosecution, and badly frightened, but has now got down at work at his desk again, and all is serene once more.

The Supreme Court.

The supreme court, which has been in session here since Monday, reached an adjournment yesterday noon. Isaac A. Roby vs. Appanoose County, Appanoose circuit court. Reversed; opinion by Adams. Farmer & Sons vs. Larsen et al., Keokuk district court. Reversed; opinion by Seavers.

Turning the Tables.

It will be remembered that a short time ago Attorney Solomon, of the Wabash road, had his hired man arrested for conspiracy to murder his family. The grand jury found no indictment, and the men were discharged. These men held a claim against Mr. Solomon for \$61 wages due them, and they assigned their claim to A. L. Young, who brought suit to recover the amount. Mr. Solomon did not appear, and judgment was taken by default, and an execution was issued and placed in the hands of a constable, who placed a crib of corn.
