Injuring the Schools.

The Regular Monthly Contribution Being Missed from the Treasury.

Rumors that the Schools Would Be Closed Contradicted

The Building of the New House on Thirteenth Street Abandoned.

The schools, they say, will be kept up for ten months as heretofore, being runn on credit for the two months if no money is paid into the treasury.
