THE TIMBER OF PUGET SOUND .- The ir tree growths of Puget Sound form one of the wonders of the American world. They verage 200 feet in height, and some specnens have been cut that measured 320 feet length and 12 feet in diameter at the base. with a straight and well proportioned log ngth of ninety feet to the first limb. The edar trees are in like proportion, and are most valuable for wooden ware of all riads, while the firs are the best for spar and ship timber yet found in any country. There are few nations that do not use them in ship-building. One-fourth the wealth of San Francisco was culled from the firs of Puget Sound while the government slept, and to-day all the principal steam mill owners who saw and prepare for market 100,000 to 200,000 feet a day to each mill and there are thirty or more mills—are residents of San Francisco, where they invest their profits, to the great injury of residents of the Sound. There is, apparently, no exhaustion of the timber, and a cenary will possibly elapse before the Puget Sound forests will be cleared of their im-Menso resources of varied tree growths.
