There was a sharp demand for Missouri Pacific, Western Union, Union Pacific and Northern Pacific; for both long and short accounts. The market closed strong at the best figure of the day, compared with Saturday it was 2½ c higher, except for Central Pacific, which was 1 c lower; Reading 4 c and Michigan Central 2 c.
