TARIFF REFORM. Address to the People by the Massachusetts League.

The executive committee of the Massachusetts Tariff Reform League, through Josiah Quincy, its secretary, has issued the following address to the people of Massachusetts:

To the People of Massachusetts—More than 20 years ago, to meet the exigencies of the great civil war, congress imposed a tariff of duties on imports higher than this country had ever before known, and higher than any civilized nation now maintains.

The defenders of our present extravagant system of protection assert that it brings about the general high wages in this country. But it is absurd to suppose that taxes on the necessities of life and on the instruments of production should be raised to such a height as to make higher in this country in the industries not affected by protection, in agriculture, the mechanic trades, and in the self-supporting manufactures.
