THE Iowa republican state convention will meet at Des Moines on the 20th of this month, and the Nebraska republicans will hold their state convention at Omaha on the 27th. It will be the duty of these conventions to place in nomination presidential electors, and they should be very careful not to select any man who holds a federal or state office, as such a person, under the constitution is not eligible to the position of elector. It is proposed in Nebrasks to nominate as one of the electors a national banker, and this at once raises the question whether the officer of a national bank can hold the position of presidential elector. We are not positive on this point, but we are inclined to the opinion that the relations sustained by the national banks to the government make its officers quasi national officers.

In his address before the National Civil Service Reform league, delivered at the annual meeting held at Newport last week, George William Curtis paid the following high compliment to President Arthur:
