MINOR MENTION.

The Republicans meet in Convention and Frame One.

At the republican town convention held yesterday afternoon, D. C. Bloomer was chairman and M. G. Griffin secretary.

The following delegates were declared entitled to seats: First Ward—A. S. Bonham, George Carson, Wm. Sears, Wall McFadden, H. H. Field.

Second Ward—N. C. Taggart, W. Reper, J. W. Clatsch, C. E. Har, C. S. Hubbard, Theo. Guitler, E. Sears, F. A. Sackett, John Fox.

Third Ward—John Bennett, D. Malby, D. C. Bloomer, M. G. Griffin, John Lindt, S. D. Street.

Fourth Ward—Phil Armour, A. T. Flickinger, D. W. Patterson, E. R. Fonda, M. A. Moran, M. C. Egan, Elmer Pratt, L. M. Kohl, L. Kinnehan.

On motion of H. H. Field, the convention proceeded to an informal ballot for three candidates for justices of the peace.

Wm. Sears named A. J. Hart, Mr. Kinnehan presented the name of J. S. B. Cogshall, Mr. A. T. Flickinger named E. J. Abbott, John Lindt named two—J. C. Rhoadbeck and John Stewart.

D. C. Bloomer named Charles H. Gilmore.

The informal ballot resulted: Abbott 29, Cogshall 23, Rhoadbeck 10, Gilmore 9, Hart 4, Stewart 1.

On motion of Phil Armour the three having the highest number of votes in the informal ballot were declared the nominees by acclamation, they being Abbott, Cogshall and Rhoadbeck.

On motion of W. H. Field an informal ballot was taken for three constables.

Wall McFadden, John Fox, David Mottaz, George Edgar, M. A. Gregory, E. Rosecrans.

The informal ballot resulted: McFadden 28, Fox 28, Gregory 12, Rosecrans 9, Edgar 9, Mottaz 3.

The nomination of Wall McFadden was made unanimous by acclamation and a formal ballot was ordered for the third candidate for constable.

Mr. Griffin made an appeal in behalf of Mr. Rosecrans, and Mr. Bloomer seconded the appeal.

These speeches seemed to do little good, Gregory receiving 10, and Rosecrans 15. The nomination of M. A. Gregory was then made unanimous.

The next place to be filled on the ticket was that of township clerk. Wm. Sears named L. Kinnehan, and on motion of Mr. Flickinger his nomination was made unanimous by acclamation.

D. Malby's name was presented for township clerk, but he declined. John Lindt named H. H. Field. He was nominated unanimously by acclamation.

Adjournment was then taken.

THE TOWN TICKET.

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THE KIDD "DUNN" UP.

He Makes a Break From a Policeman Who Shoots Him Twice—Under the Gaslight in the Bluffs.

There was a shooting affair between 3 and 4 o'clock yesterday morning, which has caused no little commotion, especially among the sporting classes.

Officer John Dunn was the shooter, and the target was John Leonard, known as "The Kid."

A short time ago, when Bill Lacy's pocket was picked of \$500, the Kid was suspected of having been the nimble-fingered fellow who got it, but on being arrested and searched, no proof was obtained and he was let go.

According to Officer Dunn's statement it appears that while standing at the corner of Main street and Broadway early yesterday morning, a man came in from the east, and going toward the station, crossing diagonally Broadway and Main street, Leonard put his hand in his pocket as if to pull a gun, and as Dunn started to step around to the fellow's right side to prevent him, the kid broke and ran.

Dunn pulled his revolver and fired. The fellow was going through the fellow's hat, grazing the skin above the right temple, the other striking him in the back. The fellow kept running and soon got out of sight. Dunn went after another officer, and a lantern, and when he returned to look for him, he had been taken into the gambling rooms where he was first arrested, and a doctor had been called in.

After having his wounds dressed he was taken to the Coy house, and was able yesterday to be about the streets.

The other side of the story is that Dunn had been drinking, and that he went into Mark's old gambling rooms, and seeing Leonard arrested him on the

old charge of picking Lacy's pocket, and that when "the Kid" learned this he said he wouldn't go, and pulling away from Dunn started to run, and was shot. He ran into the alley to get out of the way, and dropped there, and Dunn never followed up to see how badly he was hurt, or anything about it.

"The Kid" has a hard name, and his chief business seems to be the ring game. If one-half told about him is true he ought to have been driven out of the city long ago.

While he is entitled to no sympathy, yet it is not clear that Dunn was justified in shooting clear that Dunn was justified in shooting him, as he had no warrant, and did not see any offense committed. The police-men cannot be too careful how they blaze away with their little guns.

The real blame for such performances, however, rests further back upon the city government, which allows saloons and gambling houses to run openly all night, thus affording harboring places for just such fellows as "the Kid."

The city government can do little, however, toward regulating or controlling such places so long as city officials place themselves under political and financial obligations to those who keep them, and favor such places with their personal presence and support.
