

AN ORIENTAL TYPROON. TERRESTS LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.

San Fuancisco, October 27,-The steamer Vrable, which arrived yesterday from China and Japan, brings the following further details of the great typhoon which September II caused such terrible destruction of life and property in Yokohama and Tokio. The storm came up so rapidly and with such tremendous fary that no precautions could be taken. In Yokohama the entire lower part of the city, called "The Settlement," was completely wrecked, not a house being left standing. The inhabitants made no attempt to save their property, but fled for their lives to escape property, but fied for their lives to escape drowning from the rushing waters driven on land by the fury of the wind. The higher portion of the city, being more exposed, was equally unfortunate. Several of the largest and most substantial buildings were swept away, as if built of pastebeard. In that sec-tion alone 125 houses were destroyed and 390 damaged. The less of life on shore is less than at sea. Out of eighty sailing versels, lifty-three were lost with 233 persons aboard. Twelve vessels with 125 persons are also miss-ing. Of five lifeboats that went to rescue the drowning crews, four were swamped and ten drawning crews, four were swamped and ten of their crews drawned. The typhoan was the severest experienced since 1870.


