He is readily recognized in the street by his ender form and his im countenancet, and when he rises in court both the bar and the bench give immediage attention. Evarts will attend to no cases that are not of the highest importance. His oratory is noted for the length of its sentences, some of which would fill a page in an ordinary hock would fill a page in an ordinary book. This is natural, and, therefore, incurable; but in his case it does not impair the force of argument. He is not, probably making money now as rapidly as a few years ago, but there are many here who would like to give him \$25,000 for his professional income. Evarts is now near three score and ten, but still retains the fullness of his powers, and expects to last dozen years or more. Fullerton is skill in cross-examination.
