OMAHA is now one of the best paved cities in this country. The streets and alleys of the entire business center are paved with Sioux Falls granite or sheet asphalt, the two best pavements in the world. It is of course admitted that granite is the most durable pavement, and the best adapted for heavy traffic streets. On the other hand asphalt is smooth and noiseless, and certainly makes a beautiful pavement. When well laid, as it has undoubtedly been in this city, it is quite durable. While it may wear out in places, it is so easily and cheaply repaired that many people prefer it to granite. The Barber asphalt company is under contract to keep it in repair for five years, and offers to repair it for ten, fifteen or twenty years at ten cents a yard per annum, which is a mere trifl. So far, the asphalt pavement has taken the greater portion of the heavy traffic, as teamsters prefer it, because it is so easy to haul heavy loads over it, and yet this pavement has shown little, if any, wear from the heavy traffic. We do not hesitate to say that the asphalt pavement has proved to be all that was claimed for it, when it was introduced here. The pavements have certainly worked a wonderful improvement in our streets, have increased the value of property, facilitated the transaction of business, and given us a reputation abroad for enterprise. The money put into pavements has proved a splendid investment, and we believe the people will have no hesitancy in voting, on next Tuesday, in favor of \$50,000 additional paving bonds for extending the work next year. We now have nearly ten miles of pavement, including the alleys, but some extensions are needed to make the system complete.

SECRETARY McCULLOCH.
President Arthur seems especially careful in his selection of treasury secretary and his appointment of Hon. Hugh McCulloch, of Indiana, is to be commended. Without doubt he is one of the ablest American financiers of the day, and his reputation is by no means confined to the United States, for his operations in American securities with the capitalists of Europe have made his standing in the prominent monetary markets of the world recognized and appreciated. Mr. McCulloch will bring to the performance of his duties valuable experience in addition to his high qualifications, for he was appointed secretary of the treasury by President Lincoln on March 7th, 1865, as successor to Salmon P. Chase, and held that office during the Johnson administration. Prior to the war he was president of the Indiana State bank and carried that institution safely through the black year of 1873 when other western banks were being swept from their financial moorings like crafts in a cyclone. The inauguration of the national banking system brought Mr. McCulloch to the comptrollership of the currency, and to him really belongs the credit of properly arranging and nourishing the system, which is without doubt the best ever instituted in the United States. In fact Mr. McCulloch set the machinery in motion that accomplished the resumption of Secretary Sherman's term. He was always an opponent of inflation and continually fought against the maintenance of a war currency in times of peace. While his financial policy seemed at all times to meet public favor his views on the tariff were too far away from a proper protection line, and too near the fallacious doctrine of free trade to harmonize with the sound, patriotic thinking minds of the country. 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
